Members.

It is with pleasure, but also a deal of sadness that this 70th and last Annual Report of your Association, the Tasmanian Amateur Athletic Association for season 1980/81 is presented. After being in existence for 79 years, there must be regrets that the Association is disbanding but also excitement, enthusiasm and optimism for the future of all amateur athletics in Tasmania under the new Association.

The past year has seen a great deal of change the great majority undoubtedly for the good but unfortunately the number of participants has shown an alarming decrease. Hopefully it will be only a temporary decline because without sufficient competitors the sport is in trouble.

Two main changes occurred during last season - the agreement to form the Amateur Athletic Association of Tasmania to control athletics for men and women in the state and the decision that the T.A.A.A. should organise and control all intrastate. interstate and international meetings in the state.

At a meeting in Campbell Town on Sunday 29th March, 1981 it was decided that the A.A.A. of Tasmania should be formed to control all amateur athletics in Tasmania as from the 1st April and to seek affiliation with the Amateur Athletic Union of Australia immediately. An Executive Committee was elected to run the Association until the first Annual General Meeting could elect a full council and a constitution was adopted. The Executive and its management sub committee has worked extremely well so far and there is great optimism for the future.

With the Association responsible for all the major meetings of the year, control was much more effective. Naturally there was still a great reliance on the branches for the actual conduct of the meetings, but the load was spread much more evenly. The decision to appoint a specific organiser for each meeting proved very effective. The overall result was a series of most successful carnivals both athleticly and financially.

The decrease in registrations to the second smallest member in the last fourteen years is most disturbing. Especially is this so in the South where the decline to less than 300 from a high of 477 ten years ago is cause for great concern. The new Association must face the challenge of finding the reasons and attempt to discover a remedy or remedies.

One of the highlights of the season was the completion of the building at the Domain Athletic Centre and its official opening by the Lord Mayor of Hobart, Alderman D.R. Plaister M.B.E. on 13th December, 1980. Although the final cost of nearly \$30,000 was far more than could be really afforded, the pavilion has proved its worth and so the money spent has been a good investment. The administration and conduct of all meetings has been improved immensely, the public address and communications equipment are permanent fixtures and so will be less costly to maintain. It is now possible to hold committee meetings and small social functions there and in time the installation of electric timing and photo finish equipment and the establishment of an administrative centre will result in a very full utilisation of the building.

Your Association was honoured to conduct the Shell/Chas Hansen National Under 17 Meeting last January and with the Alcoa Challenge Series Meet made up the two major interstate meetings of the season held in Tasmania. The weather was good for both and high class performances resulted, highlighted by Peter Gandy Australian 200 metres record of 20.3 sec.

The Tasmanian Government again made grants available to assist with the travel costs of the Track and Field team which competed in the Australian Championships in Adelaide and to offset the cost of hiring the Domain Athletic Centre. These grants are greatly appreciated by the council and the members of the state team.

With the withdrawal of the Mars Confectionery sponsorship it was necessary to find another sponsor for registration numbers. Coca Cola Bottles readily agreed to contribute \$750 to cover the cost of both mens and womens numbers and this with \$1,000 given to assist with the conduct of the Tasmanian Schoolchildrens Championship emphasis the generosity of the company and thanks must be extended to Mr. Dean Hall for his effort in this regard.

Adidas again donated 20 sets of competition costumes in state colours and \$250 in cash as well as supplying additional uniforms and track suits at special prices. With six teams representing the state each year and every athlete entitled to one singlet and a pair of shorts free the cost is becoming very significant - over \$3,000 being spent on uniforms last season.

The selection of Stephen Knott in the Australian team to compete in the Pacific Conference Games in Christchurch on 31st January and 1st February was the highlight of the competitive side of the season. Other fine performances were Australian sub junior records by Garry Bissett and Graham Tudor and Gary's selection in the Australian Schoolboys Track and Field Team, whilst your Secretary was appointed Manager of the Australian Pacific Conference Games Team.

Only seven full council meetings were held during the year with the Executive and the Board of Management dealing with routine matters and circulating reports of their actions. REGISTRATIONS

The loss of 107 registrations for the season was a tremendous disappointment and was the lowest figure since 1971/72. All branches dropped - South by 50, North 12 and North West 45. The only redeeming features was that senior registrations increased by 20, perhaps because of the veterans and juniors by 3. All other groups except Under 12 decreased with the worst effected age being Under 15 down 29. New registrations totalled 210 approx. 30%, also a decrease on last season.

Many reasons have been put forward for the decline and possibly all have contributed. Undoubtedly the growth of the Veterans Association has taken a few of the senior athletes likewise Little Athletics is catering for up to the Under 12 group, and Saturday morning shopping has a considerable influence in Hobart. The new Association must undoubtedly take stock and in conjunction with branches and clubs seek ways and means of increasing the attractiveness of the sport.

TRACK AND FIELD

Coca Cola Tasmanian All School Championships

Hobart

Coca Cola increased its sponsorship to a generous \$1,000 and the organising committee of Barry McLeod, Andrew Willis and Brian Roe invited several Victorian athletes to attend to help promote the meeting. Unfortunately due to an airline strike they were unable to travel and the meeting missed out on this boost.

However the programme was an improvement on previous years and with an increase in entries to approximately 200 athletes the meeting was quite a success. Of the girls 34 events 18 resulted in new records and the boys broke 15 and equalled 2 records including 1 Tasmanian Under 17 record in their 43 events indicating the high standard being reached.

Appreciation of the work of the organisers must be expressed as their efforts resulted in a top class meeting which will improve even further in the years to come.

These Championships were used as trails for the Australian Championships which were held in Sydney and the boys team of 16 and girls of 15 were named immediately afterwards.

AUSTRALIAN ALL SCHOOLS CHAMPIONSHIPS Sydney

13th & 14th December, 1980

The Selectors named a team of 16 to compete in these Championships which were sponsored by Comsteel. Andrew Willis was appointed manager. Of the team of 16, 6 were in the Under 19 group, 8 Under 17 and 2 Under 15.

Conditions for the meeting were quite good - warm to hot but a strong gusty wind on the Sunday hampered performances. Entries were good, in some cases too good so that the standards will need to be reviewed to eliminate some of the additional competitors.

AUSTRALIAN ALL SCHOOLS CHAMPIONSHIPS (Cont.)

The outstanding Tasmanian performances—was by Gary Bissett who won the Under 17 1,500 metres in 3 min. 59.9 sec. and was second in the 3,000 metres in 8 min. 57.6 sec. only .4 sec. behind the winner. As a result he was named in the Australian Schools Team. Murat Djakic also performed extremely well to finish second in the Under 19 Decathlon scoring 5,679 points, to the winner 5,781, after leading by 87 after the first day. Tasmania's only other medal, a bronze, was won by David Ashcroft in the Under 15 200 metres in 23.17 sec. David also finished fourth in the High Jump clearing 1.76m whilst Graham Tudor was fourth in the Under 17 110 metres hurdles recording 15.02 sec. Special thanks are extended to Owen Oakes for his assistance to the team as liaison officer.

NORTH V SOUTH AND TRIANGULAR

Hobart

6th December, 1980

The weather was excellent for this meeting which has caused quite a deal of discussion over recent years as a result of less than full support received from many athletes. The organising committee under the direction of Brian Eldridge did its job very well and has conducted a survey on ways and means of improving the meeting and will present recommendations to the council in due course.

Competition was quite keen and reasonably even with standards fair to average. Officials were scarce early but finally sufficient reported to enable events to be conducted according to the timetable which certainly needs some revision.

North scored a good win in the North v South and completed the double in the White City competition.

PENTATHLON

Entries improved by four to a total of 16, - 7 seniors, 3 juniors and 5 sub-juniors and all but one completed the event.

To improve the attraction of the meeting events for Little Athletes and City of Hobart Championships were conducted in conjunction with the Pentathlon and as a result a good crowd was in attendance.

In winning the championship Stephen Foster of Ulverstone broke the Tasmanian Allcomers record scoring 3,240 points to improve on Ian Murray's 3,085 points set in 1974. With the withdrawal of Stephen Knott after four events Stephen had a very convincing win.

The Under 20 competition was much closer however and although Murat Djakic (NL) led from the start he received plenty of opposition from Rod McCafferty (R'side) and Shane Foster (Ulv.). His score of 2,956 was only 109 points outside Michael Mol's record.

Jonathan Venn (NL) also led from the start in the Under 17 competition, increasing his lead after every event to have a 371 margin at the finish.

ALCOA CHALLENGE SERIES

In direct contrast to last year the weather for this, the second annual Aloca Challenge Series meeting held in Hobart was excellent. The official programme was conducted between 4.00 p.m. and 6.15 p.m. with invitation events being held earlier in the afternoon. Twelve Alcoa Squad members came from interstate and provided the good crowd with some excellent athletics.

A 100 yards race was programmed to provide the top sprinters Peter Gandy and Bruce Frayne with a chance to break the Tasmanian record of 9.6 secs. However the 200 metres proved to be the highlight with Peter Gandy (NSW) breaking the Australian record with a time of 20.3 sec., Bruce Frayne (SA) was timed at 20.4 sec. and Paul Blackaby (ES) in finishing third set a Tasmanian residential record of 21.3 sec. Naturally Peter Gandy was awarded the Athlete of the Meet Trophy for his performance.

Once again the Alcoa organisation headed by Tom Worrell together with assistance from the A.A.U. staff arranged great promotional lead ups. The set up of the ground showed what could be achieved with expertise and reasonable funding.

A pleasant social function was held at the completion of the competition.

Unfortunately Tasmania can not provide the depth of performers to provide worthwhile competition for squad members brought from other states. It would appear that it may be better to bring complete fields in two or three events to attract spectators other than the regular athletic supporter.

SHELL/CHARLES HANSEN UNDER 17 MEETING Hobart 17th & 18th January, 1981

Your Association was responsible for the staging of this meeting and the Board of Management undertook the responsibility of its organisation and conduct. Once again the Shell Company provided generous sponsorship in the way of air fares for visiting athletes which included a small team from the A.C.T. for the first time. It also hosted a function for all teams at the Westside Motor Inn on Friday 16th January. The Tasmanian Manager Mr. Graham Cooper and his staff greatly assisted Mr. Frank Nott who was again appointed manager of the state team with Mr. Bob Mazey as his assistant. Selectors named the team a month before which allowed a good preparation.

Conditions on both days were excellent - quite warm and with very little wind.

The highlight of the first day was team Captain, Gary Bissett's easy win in the 1500 metres, whilst Vice Captain Graham Tudor broke his own State 110 metres hurdles record in finishing third in 14.7 secs.

Both these boys again performed creditably on the second day with Bissett outlasting Malcolm Norwood (Vic.) in a punishing finish to the 3000 metres, this taking the distance double. Tudor ran a creditable 57.0 sec. to take 2nd placing in the 400 metres hurdles.

The only other Tasmanian placeyetter was Angus Barnes who was 3rd in the 800 metres.

SHELL/CHARLES HANSEN UNDER 17 MEETING (Cont.)

A number of team members performed extremely well but found the competition too strong. Dominic Barber (Javelin) and Peter Sherwood (Triple Jump) gained bronze medals last year with 50.80m and 13.07m respectively, but although they improved to 56.90m and 13.35m they were unplaced this year.

Robert Kay (2000 metres Steeplechase), Alister Howard (Pole Vault) and Hammer Thrower, Emil Djakic produced personal best performances.

The 5 medals: 2 firsts - 1 second - 2 thirds - whilst not as successful as in 1980, was most creditable considering the higher standard of competition in which 10 Tasmanian Allcomers records were broken.

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VICTORIA v SOUTH AUSTRALIA v TASMANIA Melbourne 26th January, 1981

The Victorian A.A.A. was host this year and selected the Australia Bay holiday for the competition. It conducted a New South Wales v Victoria in conjunction with the triangular match.

With a limit of two athletes per state per event and 19 events in the competition a team of 25 was selected. There were five withdrawals and one replacement leaving 21 to compete under the managership of C.A. "Froggy" Wise.

The team travelled at various times between the previous Thursday and the Monday and stayed at different places making the managers job very difficult.

VICTORIA v SOUTH AUSTRALIA v TASMANIA (Cont.)

The weather was extremely hot with a top of 42.7°C during the competition which drastically effected the performance of the athletes especially those who were in more than one event.

The team performed up to standard with David Huxley 1st in the Hammer 63.36m, Pat Kaufman 2nd 3000m Steeplechase 9 min. 25.8 sec. and David Smith 2nd 3000 metres 8 min. 27 sec. the best. Richard Carter High Jump 1.90m, Andrew Edwards Javelin 58.08m and David Conley 800 metres 1 min. 54.1 sec. all finished third.

This meeting is of great value to athletes who are the best or near best in the state but not quite up to Australian Championship standard - giving them a taste of interstate competition and the experience that could help to lift them to better performances.

Unfortunately the conduct of the meeting was not up to the usual Victorian standards and left a lot to be desired.

A good field of seven contested the senior events the same as last year, the five in the junior was two little. However the sub junior was very disappointing with only two entries yet it proved to be the best contest. The T.W.A.A.A. again conducted its multiple event Championship in conjunction - the first Heptathlon Tasmanian Championships. Unfortunately they were not well supported there being only three senior, 1 junior and 1 sub junior competitors.

With very good weather conditions on both days, the Saturdays events interspersed with interclub provided an interesting programme. In an attempt to improve the Sunday selected relay events were scheduled but the response from the clubs was very poor. Hopefully next year if the idea is persevered with, the response will be better.

There were two New South Wales competitors in the senior event whilst the Tasmanian entries were spread - South seven, North four and North West one.

Steven Knott completely dominated the senior event with the absence of Stephen Foster through injury. He established a 200 point lead in the first event and increased it to a commanding 1,119 at the finish. The only retirement was in the Under 20 event which was won convincingly by Shane Foster by 790 points. In the Under 17 Sandy Bay club mates Peter Sherwood and Anthony Baker had a great tussle. Peter led for three events only to be passed after the high jump but drew level at the end of the first day. Anthony led for the next two events dropped behind after the Pole Vault recovered the lead with a good Javelin Throw and although beaten in the 1500 metres won by I3 points and established a new Tasmanian record.

A direct telecast by the ABC for approx. 2 hours on the last afternoon plus videotape highlights by TVT6 gave exceptionally good coverage with the viewing audience swelled considerably by the fact that it rained very heavily from mid afternoon onwards. The value of the all weather track was amply illustrated for after competition was suspended for a short time events were conducted with only the wet and bedraggled officials being really inconvenienced.

Once again tribute must be paid to the officials who performed so well over the three days. Although there were never too many officials available, events were on time for the most part and all stuck to the job even when the rains came.

Entries were down on 1980 as was to be expected with the decrease in registrations - 223 invididuals competed compared with 267 whilst relay entries dropped from 72 to 65. A strong contingent from Sydney again competed with St. George under the managership of Alleyn Gainford visiting for the third year in a row. Northern Suburbs and Campbell Town were also well represented.

A total of 114 titles were decided and winners were spread over 13 clubs - the 11 Tasmanian and two from New South Wales. Sandy Bay again showed its strength by winning 37 events, covering all age groups, an increase of 9 on last year. North Launceston although not scoring in Under 12 or Under 11 were only one down winning 26. Then followed Eastern Suburbs 10, 0.V.A., Northern Suburbs and Tamar all 7, Newstead and Ulverstone 4, Riverside 3, Burnie/Wynyard 2, Devon 1, whilst St. George won 4 and Campbell Town 2. Ignoring the interstate winners South won 66 titles, North 40 and North West 7.

Sandy Bay completed a very good season by winning the Hobart Harrier Cup convincingly but by a much less margin than in 1980 - 10 as compared to 21. 0.V.A. were second and Eastern Suburbs third. Sandy Bay also finished on top in every other age group except Under 14 and Under 13 which North Launceston won convincingly.

In spite of the excellent conditions, overall the standard of performance appeared to be down although two Allcomers and two Residential records were broken in addition to the Senior Pentathlon and Decathlon Under 17 set prior to the Championship meeting. Graham Tudor set new figures for the two Under 17 hurdle events, whilst 0.V.A. broke the Resident 4×400 metres Relay and Shane Foster the Residential Discus Under 20.

Stephen Knott (ES) was again the pick of the senior athletes winning four events whilst Ian Murray (NS), Martin Graney (SB) and Pat Kaufman (O.V.A.) scored doubles. In Under 20, no-one starred although Shane Foster (Ulv.), Paul Clarke (R'side) and Peter Sherwood (SB) had two wins. On the other hand the Under 17 age group had a number of very good performances. Peter Sherwood (SB) added four wins and a second to his Under 20 wins giving him six titles altogether. Gary Bissett (SB) scored a treble in the middle distance events whilst Graham Tudor (T) won the two hurdle events and the 100 metres Adam Clay (SB) and Anthony Baker (SB) scored doubles.

David Ashcroft (ES) dominated Under 15 with five wins whilst John O'Loughlin (SB) won the 800m and 1500m doubles. The Baldwin twins from North Launceston, performed extremely well in Under 14. Tom had three wins and a second whilst David won the 100m and was second to Tom in the 200m. Keiron Foley (0.V.A.) won two events whilst good performances Under 13 were Charles Walters (NL), Shane Cramer (B/W) and Shane Leslie (NL).

J. Mahoney (SB) with three wins and M. Butterworth (O.V.A.) two wins and two seconds dominated in Under 12 whilst Chris Jacoara (SB) was best of the Under 11's.

Without any doubt Steven Knott was the athlete of the 1979/80 season. He finished second in the Australian Long Jump Championship with a leap of 7.60 metres, set a State Pole Vault Record of 4.50 metres, won three Tasmanian Championships and represented the State in the Victoria, South Australia, Tasmania match.

Michael Mol's performances were just as outstanding. He set an Australian Junior Pentathlon Record, finished equal first in the Junior Decathlon between Australia and New Zealand, broke Tas. Junior Pentathlon and Junior 110 metres Hurdles records, won the Australian Schoolboys Under 19 Pole Vault and five Tasmanian titles.

In the Sub Junior group Gary Bissett had strong opposition but his record of a new State 3000 metres and 5000 metres Sub Junior times, three Tasmanian Championsnips, State representation in the School Track and Field and Cross Country Championships and the Shell/Charles Hansen Under 17 match winning the 1500 metres was sufficient for him to receive the award.

John Venn represented Tasmania in the Australian Schools Under 15 Long Jump. He won three Under 15 Individual Championships and was a member of the two winning relay teams as well as setting a Northern Under 15 Long Jump record.

AMATEUR ATHLETIC UNION CONGRESSES

The Half Yearly Congress was held at the Sheraton Hotel, Melbourne on 20th and 21st September, 1980 and the Annual Congress at the Town House, Adelaide on 17th and 18th March, 1981. Your Association was represented at both by your President and Hon. Secretary.

Items of particular interest to Tasmania were:

AT THE HALF YEARLY CONGRESS:

Reinstatement of Veteran Professionals The matter was referred to the INAF for a ruling.

1985 World Cup A feasibility investigation be continued with a view to Camberra applying to conduct the meeting. Victoria was also considering making an application to conduct it.

Adidas Sponsorship Adidas offered the following proposal to all State Associations for two years from 1st April, 1981.

To supply free of charge equipment to the value of \$1000 per annum plus extra items and other products at special prices.

To make available each year two prizes of equipment valued at \$200 retail to the outstanding Junior boy and girl in each State.

In return the State Association endorse Adidas as the official supplier of uniforms and allow one free advertisement in each Summer Handbook.

Competing Amateur Eight letters were received from professional athletes seeking information regarding reinstatement as competing amateurs following the IAAF decision to reinstate Warren Edmonson, John Smith and others in March this year.

Following the precedent set by the IAAF and the action of the athletic Congress of the USA of reinstating professionals for domestic competition, it is recommended that the AAU reinstate athletes who have previously infringed their status for competition within Australia.

Board of Management The Board held three meetings since the 1980 Annual Congress.

The Board submitted the following matters to Congress for consideration:-

Ad Hoc Committee of Messrs. Briggs, Aitken, Bailey and Mrs. F. Wrighter together with four other people nominated by the Queensland associations appoint the remaining officials from all States and Overseas for the 1982 Commonwealth Games.

The 1980 All Schools' Track & Field Championships be conducted in New South Wales.

That the Union establish a Schools' Sub-Committee and members of the Australian Secondary Schools' Sport Federation should be invited to join such Sub-Committee.

Officials Committee It was recommended that examinations be held at the time of the National Titles. The Executive Director agreed to approach English speaking countries for details of their officials training schemes.

<u>Pacific Conference Games</u> It was agreed to support the policy of staging the Games every two years.

AMATEUR ATHLETIC UNION CONGRESSES (Cont.)

World Cross Country Team Fund Raising Each Association to be liable to voluntarily contribute \$500 whether it has an athlete in the team or not and the balance to be conducted by each Association or athlete.

Report Executive Director The Department of Home Affairs had verbally advised a grant of \$83,000 had been given to the Union.

\$22,000 employment of National Executive Director \$22,000 " Coaching Director

\$17,000 International Competition Overseas

\$10,000 " " in Australia

\$10,000 Coaching Projects

\$ 2,000 International Meetings

Recommended that the \$10,000 for competition in Australia be used to bring athletes to meetings in March, i.e. Brisbane Series, Sydney Challenge Series and the National Track & Field Championships.

A Junior to be selected in the Pacific Conference Games must compete at the Trials in Canberra in December.

The motion submitted by T.A.A.A. regarding Sub-Junior's records and the name of groupings was held over for further consideration by the Board of Management.

A schoolboy or schoolgirl now has no age limit on being able to compete in school sports without risk of infringing status.

A Mens 25000 metres has been included as an Australian Championship.

Associations may have one representation only instead of two in Australian Track and Field Championships. If more are entered, all must have reached the Australian standard.

A motion by the Queensland A.A.A. to have Australian Sub Junior Championships instead of Schoolchildrens Championships was lost as was a motion to increase the age for a female junior athlete to Under 20 years.

Elections took up a great deal of the first day and resulted as follows:

The Tasmanian Standards & Scoring Titles Committee of Robin Hood, Rex Morriss and Noel Ruddock was re-elected.

Tasmania's representative on the Officials Committee is Mavis Ebzery.

Wayne Fletcher was elected to the Walking Committee whilst Graeme Briggs was re-appointed delegate to the Australian Commonwealth Games Association and Noel Ruddock was elected as a delegate to the Australian Olympic Federation.

Your President Graham Briggs was honoured by receiving the only Merit Award conferred although there were 9 nominations. There were four nominations for Life Membership but none received the three fourthsmajority required.

Other items of interest were:-

The Union can recognise records created by women in events in which they compete against men.

An award may be made by the Board of Management to an athlete in recognition of service to athletics in Australia. It may be made whilst the athlete is still active in the sport.

It was agreed a submission be made to stage the 1985 World Cup in Camberra.

AMATEUR ATHLETIC UNION CONGRESSES (Cont.)

\$35000 has been granted to the AAU by the Commonwealth Games Association for pregames preparation.

The tabling and receipt of the Report of the Team Manager 1980 Olympic Games Moscow incorporating reports by the Manageress, Team Coach and Team Captains.

Mr. Klaus Roth wrote to the AAU enquiring about the Northern Territory affiliating as a member Association. A sub committee was formed to investigate the matter.

The Australian Track and Field Coaches Association requested affiliation status on the AAU Coaching Committee, a representative at all AAU Congresses with the right to vote on all matters concerning coaching. A decision was left over until the next Half Yearly Congress. The A.A.A. of New South Wales was allocated the staging of the selection trials for the 1983 World Cross Country Championships.

CONFERENCE OF STATE SECRETARIES

Two meetings were held at the time of the AAU Congresses. Main items of discussion were a review of the Alcoa Challenge Series and the National Squad, and consideration of the coming season with ways and means of improvement.

It was felt that a calendar of dates of all first class meetings to be held in Australia be compiled and circulated. It would be necessary of course for Associations to submit their calendar as soon as possible to make these at all worthwhile.

Commonwealth Games New Zealand interested in competing in the Australian trials. The relay from Albany (WA) appears to be a goer. Associations will need to promote meetings in July and August 1982 to assist athletes in their preparation and training.

The Institute of Sport in Canberra will contribute towards the cost of its athletes competing at National Championships. Details will be worked out in due course.

MERIT AWARDS

Nominations were called according to Constitutional procedure and those received were referred to the specially appointed sub-committee. It recommended to the 1980 Annual General Meeting that Les Spears and Brian Baxter be the recipients.

Your President made the presentation of the plaques as separate ceremonies - to Brian Baxter at a dinner in Launceston and to Les Spears at the official opening of the administration building at the Domian Athletic Centre in Hobart.

The citations on which the awards were made were:

- Brian Baxter North Launceston competitor since 1966, Life Member 1979.
 Club Delegate 1969-70. Represented North in Track & Field on 5 occasions and Cross Country 6 times. Tas. Cross Country Team 1973, 1974. Won Tas. 3000 metres Steeplechase 1975.
- Leslie Spears Eastern Suburbs Coach 1955-65, Committee 1955-65, President 1966-69, Life Member. Timekeeper Southern Branch for 13 years, Committee Member 1958-62. President and Life Member of the Southern Amateur Athletic Branch, Southern Belegate to the TAAA 1955-62.

DOMAIN ATHLETIC CENTRE

The erection of the pavilion was the main improvement at the Domain Athletic Centre during the year. The pavilion was in use for the first meeting of the season and was an outstanding success.

Further improvements are required but these must wait until finance is available.

The pavilion was declared open by the Lord Mayor of Hobart at a function after the seventh round of the Southern premiership competition on 13th December, 1980. That day featured the Lionel Skeggs and Tas. Bevis memorial races, which are organised by the Eastern Suburbs Harrier Club. The Associations Merit Award was presented to Mr. L.W. Spears during the meeting. Mr. Spears was a stalward of the Eastern Suburbs Club, Life Members of the Association and the Southern Branch and prominent officials during the past twenty years were involved to what was a memorable occasion.

BRANCH REPORTS

SOUTH

The season could be termed as moderately successful. It was not a roaring success because registrations were down and there just didn't seem to be the depth in performance which has come to be expected over the past few years.

Nevertheless, there was only 1 Interclub round which was abandoned because of a down-pour. The rest of the programmes were conducted in an efficient manner but a lack of officials again did point to the need for the Branch to look very closely at the training of the people who actually allow events to happen.

The Board of Management did a fine job during the season and their dedication and determination helped to ensure that athletics developed along sound lines during the year.

It was a delight to have representatives from the womens' clubs again this year and the input by the delegates was excellent. Added to this, the Veterans Association was represented at the committee table because that Association was recognised as a club within the organisational structure of the Branch. Although naturally not successful in terms of winning many events because of the obvious inability to compete in under age events, the advent of this group of dedicated athletes certainly added a great deal to the competitive nature of our sport.

The Chairmen of our Sub-committees must be thanked for their tasks undertaken during the season and particular mention is made of the Finance Committee which, led by Noel Ruddock did a very good job and the indication of the success of their work may be seen in the very healthy balance sheet with which will be carried into the next season.

There were however, one or two areas which definitely need strengthening over the next season. The Equipment Committee failed to function as it should have done, mainly because of the additional work load which the original chairman Mr. Bert Ginn had to undertake as a private consultant. Nevertheless equipment was kept up to standard and a move has been made to refurbish the equipment for the beginning of next season.

*Following on from a very dedicated Secretary last season. Glen Appleyard, the Branch was most fortunate to gain the services of Wayne Mason and mention must be made of the excellent manner in which he performed his most onerous duties.

With the formation of the new controlling body the Branch will invite womens' clubs to join in the administration and will take the opportunity to reconstruct its administration and adopt a new Constitution.

Of some concern during the track and field season was the fall off in attendances by both athletes and spectators at the Domain Centre. A number of special events including Tuesday night twilight meetings, City of Hobart Championships and Special Relay events were organised in a bid to lift interest and to promote the sport but these disappointingly met with only minimal support.

It is hoped that this is only a temporary trend which will be arrested in the new season.

Despite this disappointing aspect the track and field season had several highlights. Probably the most outstanding performance was the brilliant Australian 200 metre record run by Peter Gandy during the ALCOA meet in January. In one of the best races witnessed at the Domain, Gandy was pushed all the way by Bruce Frayne with local star Paul Blackaby hot on their heels with a state record equalling run of 21.3 secs.

The performance of Gary Bissett in winning the 1500/3000 metres double in the Australian Sub Junior Match held at the Centre, the selection of Steven Knott in the Australian Pacific Conference Games team and his subsequent silver medal in the long jump in Christchurch together with the selection of our hardworking treasurer Noel Ruddock as manager of that Australian team were further highlights.

The Sandy Bay Club continued their dominance of the Interclub competition with their sixth successive track and field premiership win. Their numerical strength, organisation and club spirit was again too much for other clubs and enabled them to win every interclub round.

Cross Country continues to thrive with large fields contesting events throughout the winter. Of note was the increasing number of athletes competing for the Veteran's Club but the highlight of the season was the winter premiership win by Eastern Suburbs who brought to a halt the outstanding twelve year winning sequence of Sandy Bay.

The Branch acknowledges the assistance of the news media throughout the year. The Mercury, radio stations 7HT, 7HO and 7ZR and television stations, Channel 2 and 6 provided a good coverage of events. It is hoped that the excellent relationship enjoyed will continue in future years.

Once again the combined Men's and Women's State Championships were held over three days of the March weekend. Despite the deluge which occurred on the third day, the meeting was a success and this is due in no small way to the dedicated officials of the Branch, the T.A.A.A. and the T.W.A.A.A.

The 1980 Cross Country and Road Season started on a high note with Eastern Suburbs dominating the early rounds. As the season progressed Sandy Bay and Northern Suburbs improved dramatically. With three rounds remaining any of the three teams could have won but Eastern Suburbs managed to hand on to win by two points from Northern Suburbs. Their win ended a sequence of twelve consecutive premiership successes by the Sandy Bay Club.

The competitiveness between the clubs was at an all time high and this helped produce many fine performances.

At the conclusion of the season two stalwarts of Cross Country, Frank Hill and Michael O'Loughlin indicated that they would not be seeking re-election to their respective positions of Chairman and Treasurer of the Cross Country Committee. Both have been tireless workers in this area of Branch activities and their contribution has lead to the development of cross country to the strong position that it enjoys today. The loss of their knowledge and experience will be difficult to overcome. To both, the Branch offers its thanks for their services.

A total of 15 interclub rounds were scheduled during the 1980-81 track and field season. As appears to be the norm each season, one of these, round 6, was abandoned because of rain. SOUTHERN ATHLETE OF THE YEAR AWARD

Through the sponsorship fo A.J. Connor and Company, a weekly award was presented throughout the track and field season to the athlete adjudged as the athlete of the week in interclub competition. The awards were not only presented to the champion athlete but also to those athletes whose performances at any level of competition were considered meritorious.

At the conclusion of the season, Paul Harwood (Northern Suburbs) was selected as the Athlete of the Year for his fine 66.0 metre javelin throw, which broke the State senior and junior records.

We thank Connors and Mr. Barry McLeod for the part they played in presenting this award.

SOUTHERN ALL SCHOOLS TITLES Saturday and Sunday October 25th and 26th

Blessed by superb weather, these championships, traditionally the first meeting of the season were held after the Independent Schools this year.

The result of this allocation of dates was, as expected, not conducive to a good support by schools.

The reason for the alteration was bought about by the new building being constructed at our headquarters and in consequence the public address system and other communications were not available and in retrospect the decision not to go ahead with the meeting as the first of the season was a wise one.

This year, 66 schools provided 560 individual entries in an extended programme because more field events were added and more distance events for girls were included in the programme. The old 150 m. distances were abandoned.

Saturday was a good day's competition with excellent fields but Sunday was a disappointment with numerous scratchings resulting in the cancellation of the majority of heats.

However, the depth of performance was quite satisfactory - 37 records were broken and this speaks rather highly for the calibre of athletes competing.

The whole programme was efficiently run and the officials did a very good job again.

The Shell Oil Company again sponsored the programme and provided funds to print entry forms, certificates and programmes. The company also offered a number of Merit Badges for outstanding performances for both boys and girls across all age groups and 16 athletes were recipients of these.

SOUTHERN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL SPORTS

Excellent weather conditions on October the 11th saw some outstanding performances in the combined sports at the Centre.

The most brilliant competitor in relation to school performance was St. Virgils College athlete, David Ashcroft, who won 5 events - 100, 200, 400, High Jump, Long Jump and then anchored his school winning relay team.

Keryn Nylander (Fahan) did well by winning the 100 and 200 and breaking the long jump record in her age group.

Simone Solomon (St. Mary's) gave an excellent display of middle distance running by taking 12 seconds off the under 14 800 m. event and then set an inaugural record in the open $1500 \, \text{m}$.

In girls events, 6 new, 2 inaugural and 2 equal records were set in track and 8 new field records established.

The boys set 8 new and equal 2 track records and 8 new field records. St. Virgils set up an early lead and held that for the entire programme but Hutchins always looked capable of upsetting the titleholders.

Sacred Heart went ahead in the early events and were never in danger of defeat.

3RD INTRA STATE HIGH SCHOOL SPORTS

This event was again organised by Alan McCreary and in contrast to the previous year, the competition was much closer and it was good to see that the North West Association provided a far greater number of competitors than they did previously.

The Tasmanian Amateur Athletic Association trophy was won by the Northern team who were excellently coached and performed very well in relays. In the girls competition, this was won by the South East region.

This meeting will grow in stature and in a few years should hopefully rival the standard evidenced in the Indpeendent School Sports. It could be possible that a representative team might travel to Interstate competition in future years. With this kind of incentive available to athletes then the performances will surely lift.

2ND COCA COLA TASMANIAN ALL SCHOOLS CHAMPIONSHIPS

These were held on the 8th November at the Centre in very good conditions and demonstrated that there is a depth of talent within this State which has to be nurtured and brought along quietly in order that the overall standard of athletics in the State can be lifted. There is no doubt that the raw potential is there and if this can be worked on by judicious coaching then the performance of Tasmanians at National level will be noted in a few years to come.

45 schools sent representatives to these sports and the programme was very tight and ran from 10.30 and concluded at 5.20 with the relays.

The stars of the meeting were Gail Millar (Marian College) and Anthony Baker (Hutchins) who were named athletes of the meeting.

Gail was outstanding, breaking records in the four events in which she took part - the Under 19, 100, 200 and 400 metres and the shot put.

Anthony Baker added 1 cm to Steven Knott's State U17 record when he cleared 1.95 metres to win the U17 high jump. At the conclusion of the meeting a State team was named to take part in the Australian All Schools Championships in Sydney on December 13th and 14th.

Members of the Southern Branch who were named in that team were David Ashcroft, Adam Clay, Gary Bissett, Peter Sherwood, Anthony Baker, Richard Carter, Matthew Fisher, Robert Johnston and the girls were Simone Solomon, Julie Hooper, Lisa Wood, Marie Johnson, Marion Priest, Gillian Dalton, Robbie Marshall.

It should be recorded that in the girls events & there are only U15, U17 & U19, Divisions', 20 records were broken whilst the boys broke 17.

NORTH VS SOUTH

Held on Saturday 6th December, this event was a fairly good indication of the relative strength of the North West, North and South in open competition.

Unfortunately, there is always some slight disagreement in relation to the point scoring situation, the number of events that competitors may enter and the weight of implements. This is not conducive to harmonious relations and it would be hoped that in future events these points of disagreement might be settled.

However, competition was very keen during the day and the very long programme commencing at 10.00 and concluding at 5.00 saw some very close contests and some very interesting interbranch rivalry.

NORTH vs SOUTH (Cont.)

Unlike last year, the Southern Branch was well represented by officials and there could be no real concern in relation to this as there was last year.

There are two separate competitions on the day for men's Branches and in the Senior Cup where competition is confined to seniors, junior (U20) and sub-juniors (U17), the northern team scored 361 points to defeat the South with 338 points. In the White City Cup for Under age competitors there is a three way contest between the North, South and North West for U15, U14, U13 and U12 competitors, the final scores were North 239, South 184, North-West 79.

Congratulations are offered to the Northern Branch on winning both of these trophies because they were well organised and had athletes who were prepared to compete in the number of events.

THE ALCOA CHALLENGE SERIES

On Sunday January the 11th, the Branch was pleased to join with the Little Athletics Association of Tasmania in presenting an excellent programme. During the course of the day the Little Athletes performed very well and showed their excellent organisation of events and it is hopeful that this type of dual competition will continue in the future.

The meeting was highlighted by a magnificent performance by Peter Gandy from New South Wales who set a new Australian 200m record when he defeated Bruce Frayne from South Australia in the time of 20.3 seconds. Frayne recorded 20.4 and Paul Blackaby established a new Tasmanian record with a superb 21.3. No where in Australia could be seen a better event and it was greeted with delight when the Australian time was announced.

There were several other fine performances and one of these was the State 3000 metres U17 record being broken by Gary Bissett who ran 8 minutes 28.6 seconds. To add a little more interest to the competition, a rather rare event nowadays, the 100 yards was organised and again Peter Gandy was too fast for his rivals Frayne and Blackaby and recorded a 9.6 seconds which in old terms was 4 yds. inside even time.

Because of the performances by Gandy, he was named Athlete of the meet and deservedly won a magnificent silver salver donated by the Alcoa Company.

At the conclusion of the meeting it was very pleasing to hear the promotor of the meeting indicate that the afternoon's competition was as good as he had seen in Australia and this reflects very creditably on the officials we were using that afternoon.

PENTATHLON

Again the Southern Branch was asked to conduct this evend and did so by combining it with a City of Hobart championships series which were run over slightly differing events from normal where 100 yards and mile events were the highlights of the meeting.

The entries in this year's events were up on last year although for some unknown reason this event does not attract as many athletes as it should do because it is after all only five events and is a very good lead up to the decathlon held later on in the season.

PENTATHLON (Cont.)

The City of Hobart championships saw some good performances but there were a number of scratchings and the actual number of entries was for all intents and purposes most disappointing.

It is hoped that these titles will be continued in the future and that greater support will be given by local athletes in order that they gain further experience and more days of competition which can only help to improve their standards.

THE SHELL/CHARLES HANSEN NATIONAL U17 MEETING

The Branch was delighted to be hosts to this event this year.

The sponsors Shell organised a most successful pre-event welcoming function at the Westside Motel where all teams gathered, in uniform and were welcomed and presented with mementoes of their selection in these championships.

The organisers of the event were most grateful for the very ready assistance given by a number of people who acted as liaison officers and to the officials who again did a first rate job in what must be described as a most successful meeting.

The standard of competition as would be expected, was excellent and indicated the depth of talent we have in this country.

New South Wales won the competition with a solid all round performance. 10 Tasmanian allcomers records were broken.

The highlight for Tasmania would have to be the dual win by Tasmanian Captain, Gary Bissett, who took out the 800 and 1500 events and he is to be congratulated on this performance.

DECATHLON AND HEPTATHLON

For the first time this year the Heptathlon event was conducted for our female athletes and the Branch was pleased to be the first to host this competition.

Once again, the Branch arranged for the Little Athletics Association to run events for their members and special events were put on for members of the Southern Branch.

There is no doubt that the Little Athletics Association took this event most seriously and that the athletes of the Southern Branch deserve some condemnation, in fact for their lack of support for those events which were put on for them. In the decathlon, entries were not as good as expected - in fact 7 senior, 5 juniors and 2 sub-juniors made up the total fields. The heptathlon was even more disappointing - 3 seniors, 1 junior and 1 sub-junior was all that could be mustered and this is just not good enough for the multiple events which should deserve a great deal more support than they receive at this present stage.

It is interesting to record the results of the heptathlon, the first one of these events to be held in this State and it saw Jocelyn Millar from Riverside win from Susan Johnson from Eastern Suburbs with Victorian competitor Gayle Anderson coming home in third position. As this was an inaugural event Jocelyn's score of 5,023 points stands as a State record. In the junior event Catherine Denis won that event again with a very good point score of 4,533 and in the sub-junior competition Amanda Coombe from Eastern Suburbs scored 2,274 points.

TASMANIA v SOUTH AUSTRALIA v VICTORIA MATCH

The annual match was conducted in Melbourne on 25th January, 1981 in extremely hot and humid conditions. The temperature reached 42.7 degrees (cel.) during competition and adversely affected the performances of competitors, particularly those who had to compete in more than one event. Nevertheless all athletes performed up to their standard in all events with David Huxley (Hammer Throw), Pat Kaufman (Steeplechase), David Conley (800 metres) and David Smith (3000 metres) turning in the best performances of the day.

THE BENDER'S REAL ESTATE TASMANIAN TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Although the responsibility of organising this event was not undertaken by the Southern Branch, the majority of officials certainly came from our Branch and the organising committee commised mostly Southern organisers.

These championships for the first time were most generously sponsored by Mr. Ray Bender and it is hoped that this support can be continued into the future. It is understood that Mr. Bender was extremely pleased with the publicity which preceded the titles and was also impressed by the television coverage which came from both Channel and TVT6.

The titles were held on February 28th and 1st and 2nd March and included all women's events over the three days which was a major success.

The first two days of competition were held under ideal weather conditions but the third day, the Monday, was a disaster in terms of weather. It absolutely poured during the mid portion of the day and competition had to be suspended for a short time. However, the value of a synthetic track certainly showed when events did continue despite the very heavy downpour and the water which lay on the track.

Once again, tribute must be paid to the officials who did such an excellent job over the three days. It is a most onerous task to give up so much time and to concentrate for such a period of time and yet I can recall only a couple of decisions which might have been queried. It is fairly easy to sit in the stand and make judgements on time keeping and judging but it's a very much more difficult job when one is right at the centre of the action. I have no doubt that our officials are as good as any in Australia.

THE BENDER'S REAL ESTATE TASMANIAN TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS (Cont.)

It was most pleasing to welcome—as competitors a very large contingent of athletes from New South Wales. The clubs, St. George, Sunderland and Northern Suburbs had approximately 35 athletes here for the weekend and their most generous comments in relation to the organisation of the meeting were noted by officials with a great deal of pleasure.

There were some excellent performances during the three days and one of the high-lights would have to be the brilliant performance by Southern athlete Brett Allender who as a junior won both the senior and junior 100 metres championships. Two other performances of note were those of Peter Brasher from Newstead who for the fourth year in succession won the prestigious 1500 metres event and the women's events were highlighted by a great performance by Sally Whiteway of Devon who won the 3 senior sprint events in very convincing fashion.

The only club competition which does take place in these championships is for the Hobart Harrier Club Cup. This is awarded for senior events only on the basis of 3 points for first, 2 for second and one for third and was won by Sandy Bay comfortably from Northern Suburbs and Eastern Suburbs.

NATIONAL TRACK & FIELD TITLES

The National Titles were held in Adelaide from 19-22nd March, 1980 at the Olympic Sports Field. In a pleasing overall performance Tasmanian athletes, men and women, collected eleven medals.

- Paul Harwood confirmed his potential with a silver medal in the junior javelin, throwing 64.14 metres. Paul finished seventh in the senior javelin.
- Steven Knott followed up his medal in the Pacific Conference Games with a silver medal in the long jump. Once again he was able to lift himself for the big occasion with a leap of 7.71 metres. Withdrew from the high jump at 1.95 metres to finish 10th.
- Brett Allender Unfortunately strained a hamstring muscle which hampered his performances. Semi finalist in the Junior 200 metres and finalist in the 100 metres for the second year in succession.
- Paul Blackaby Another sprinter unable to perform at his best because of injury. Was unplaced in 100 metres heat but made semi finals in both the 200 and 400.
- John McMurray finished 5th in a too large field of 16 in the junior 2000 metres steeplechase.
- lan Murray returned to State team representation with solid performances in the shot (6th) and discus (8th).
- Pat Kaufman After a 'big' season on the track was disappointingly put out of action by an ankle injury incurred on the day of competition.

BRANCH REPORTS (Cont.)

NORTH WEST

The President - Mr. Les. Gore tendered his resignation in February and same was accepted with regret. The Branch has functioned without a President since, and has just managed a quorum at meetings by accepting the women's Clubs delegates to the Committee.

Registrations for the season were down in numbers, Burnie/Wynyard 69 (1 down), Ulverstone 62 (8 up) managed to keep on a par with previous season, but Devon 48 (45 down) showed a very disappointing decrease. In all there were 41 0/12 - 28 U/12 Burnie/Wynyard; 28 0/12 - 34 U/12 Ulverstone; 24 0/12 - 24 U/12 Devon at the time of registering, total 179. Officials registered numbered twenty seven.

Cross Country was conducted each Sunday, rotating venues around the three areas. Fifty one registered during this period and there was a good attendance of athletes each week. Special events included State teams Title at Penguin, Forth Triangle, Wynyard to Burnie and the East Devonport Circuit for the perpetual trophies. The three latter events were all handicapped.

The North West Schoolchildrens Championships, sponsored by the Examiner Newspaper opened the track season, at the Devonport Oval on 18th October and from that date each Saturday combined competition was conducted at Ulverstone, on a point scoring system. Each week attendances excelled and this kept the organisers well occupied in seeing the programmes ran to schedule.

The Carnivals were well patronised, namely (1) Burnie Pageant where only Coastal Clubs competed on a club basis, for the positions to receive portions of the \$500 Government grant, all events were championships; (2) The Professional Carnival at Ulverstone, events conducted by Amateur Officials were for older athletes only; and (3) Forth Carnival included events for all age groups. At the latter two venues all events were handicaps.

Ulverstone conducted an age Championship meeting on the Monday holiday in January which proved most successful with representation from some of the other State Clubs giving the competition a lift.

Coastal Championships were all held at Ulverstone over three days in February. Certificates were presented to the first three place getters in all events.

Coastal representation at the Triangular meet and the State Championships was very limited. Travelling and accommodation expenses perhaps being the main reason for athletes not making themselves available for selection.

NORTH

This season has again been one of concern with the problem of a suitable ground. It is pleasing to note that the Northern Athletic Centre Board established to negotiate for an Athletic Centre reports that work has commenced on the track at St. Leonards.

Two major events have occurred since our last annual report:

- The Branch appreciates the co-operation of the Northern Womens Combined Clubs whereby five combined programmes were held during the season with the possibility of a totally combined programme for the coming year.
- 2. It is also noted that a new Association has been formed in Tasmania to control Athletics to be known as The Amateur Athletic Association of Tasmania and the Branch looks forward to the combining of the Men's and Women's Clubs in the Northern area.

The Branch Committee has met regularly and has had regular representation at the Assocattion meetings.

The Branch expresses its congratulation to the Athletes for the achievements gained in the various State competitions and, in particular, at the Australian and State Championships.

CROSS COUNTRY REPORT

A successful 1980 Cross Country Season commenced on 5th April and concluded with Trophy Night on 4th October.

Sincere appreciation is placed on record of the work of Mr. Ian Stocks who for a number of years largely carried the responsibility of Cross Country, and who following the 1979 Season resigned from the Cross Country Committee. -

TRACK AND FIELD SEASON REPORT

The 1980/81 Track Season has once again seen keen competition and fine performances from the four affiliated clubs.

Club duties at Interclub meetings were handled responsibly although the lack of officials needs to be rectified.

The drop in underage competitors is disturbing, and all clubs should continue to promote athletics in their areas to arrest this decline. Greater club liaison with Little Athletics must be encouraged to aid transition into senior ranks.

Clubs should endeavour to retain present members in addition to recruiting new ones to maintain and increase NAAB registrations.

NORTHERN SECONDARY SCHOOLS TITLES

The Bob Simmons Memorial Trophy

This Trophy, in the form of a shield, is presented to the fastest 1600 metre Relay Team at Interclub Meetings. This year Tamar Club won the Sh 1d with an all Junior Team consisting of Grant Wilson, David Preece, Graham Tudor and Craig French. Their time of 3 minutes 28.3 seconds was a Northern Junior Record.

Twilight Meetings were successful and afforded good competition. The meeting in early February proved most popular and the combined programmes at York Park were favourably received.

COCA COLA TASMANIAN ALL SCHOOLS (Domain, Hobart 8th November, 1980)

Northern Athletes won sixteen Gold medals at these championships. Murat Djakic broke the Under 19 400 metres Hurdles record, running 56.4. He added the Long Jump (6.19 metres) to make a fine double. Tony Donald was the only other northerner to put his name in the records, equalling the Under 15 Long Jump record with a leap of 5.87 metres. He also added the Javelin and Triple Jump victories to his tally. Others to take out championships were Tim Rundle (100 metres and 200 metres), Grant Wilson (400 metres), Quentin King (Hammer Throw), Vincent Males (100 metres and 200 metres), Graham Tudor (110 metres Hurdles), Dominic Barber (Javelin), Emil Djakic (Hammer Throw, Pole Vault) and Aubrey Henricks (1500 metres).

NORTH VS SOUTH

The Annual Intrastate clash was held at the Domain on Saturday, 6th December, in warm and pleasant conditions.

A bus was chartered and a great number of athletes availed themselves of this innovation. The Northern team despite a few absentees performed creditably to win both competitions thus reversing last season's senior result.

AUSTRALIAN ALL SCHOOLS TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS Sydney, 13th & 14th December, 1980

Tim Rundle was named Captain of the State Schoolboys Team to compete at the Australian All Schools Championships. Other members selected from the North were Grant Wilson (T), Murat Djakic (NL), Vincent Males (NL), Graham Tudor (T), Tony Donald (NL) and Dominic Barber (NL).

The outstanding Northern athlete at the Championships was Murat Djakic who finished second in the Under 19 Decathlon only 102 points behind the winner, with a score of 5,679 points. His silver medal was the only medal won by a Northern athlete at a competition affected by a very strong wind on the second day.

STATE MUTIPLE EVENT TITLES

North's domination of these events in recent years ended this season although John Venn and Murat Djakic (NL) were successful in winning the sub-junior and junior pentathlon titles respectively.

NAAAB athletes were in fact quite prominent in the entries for the pentathlon which was held on Sunday, 7th December, following North vs South. The fields for the decathlon had only four Northern competitors included amongst them.

Dale Combe in the juniors was the only NAAB athlete to win a medal.

SHELL CHARLES HANSEN COMPETITION

The National Under 17 competition was held in Hobart on Saturday, 17th and Sunday 18th January. Gary Bissett (SB) was captain and Graham Tudor (Tamar) was vice captain.

Northern members of the team were James McCracken, Alister Howard and Robert Kay (Newstead); Dominic Barber, John Venn, Vincent Males, Emil Djakic and Julian McGee (North Launceston) with Frank Nott as Manager.

Five Northern athletes were chosen to compete in this annual match between the three south eastern states. Owing to the very hot day, with the temperature around the 400 mark, performances were not quite up to standard. It was also disappointing that Victoria didn't enter its best athletes, which further lowered the standard of competition. Peter Brasher withdrew due to injury before the team left, Graham Tudor (T), Brooke Alexander, Tony Szolomiak, Murat Djakic (North Launceston) all competed. Graham Tudor ran a creditable 16.0 sec. for the 110 metres Hurdles, while Murat's 56.3 for the 400 metres Hurdles was very commendable. Mr. C.A. Wise from Hobart was Team Manager.

NORTHERN PENTATHLON TITLES

The Sanders Northern Pentathion Championships were conducted at Churchill Park on 31st January, 1981.

Records were set by Murat Djakic (NL) in winning the senior title. His score of 2,859 points broke the exisitng northern senior and junior records.

NORTHERN TRACK AND FIELD TITLES

The first combined mens and womens Northern Titles were conducted in excellent conditions at York Park on February 21st and 22nd.

The performances of the athletes and an excellent crowd together with the usual dedication shown by officials made the Titles one of the best meetings held in Launceston in recent years.

Sponsorship was obtained from TNT9 enabling the winners of all individual and relay events to receive gold medallions and the placegetters to get certificates.

Events for men were conducted in four age groups only - senior, under 17, under 15 and under 13. Fields were good for most events in the two older age groups, but under age entries as they had been all year were most disappointing.

NORTHERN TRACK AND FIELD TITLES (Cont.)

The "Athletes of the Meet" were Marianne Hardstaff, Jocelyn Millar and Graham Tudor. Tudor's performance of 55.5 in the 400 metres Hurdles not only created three Northern records, but also matched the standard for the Australian sub junior record.

In all, eighteen records were broken on the two days indicating the high standard of performances. Apart from Tudor's effort, the highlight was probably the 4 x 400 metres relay in which North and Tamar staged a titanic struggle. Each team set a new Northern record. North in Senior and Tamar in Junior.

TASMANIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS Domain - 28th February, 1st and 2nd March

Northern athletes performed creditably at the 1981 State Titles winning 41 championships only two below the best ever total of 43 in 1979. However, the number of placings was well down mainly due to decreased entries in younger age groups.

North Launceston was again the most successful club with 26 victories.

Riverside's improvement with 4 wins and 13 placings was noteworthy.

Poor fields in under age track events and the lack of provision for under age throwing events were major disappointments.

North Launceston showed its depth by winning 7 of the 14 relays and being placed in 5 others.

AUSTRALIAN TRACK AND FIELD TITLES

Five Northern men and six women were selected in the Tasmanian team for the National Titles which were held in Adelaide from 19th - 22nd March.

David Preece (T), Graham Tudor (T), Michael Mol (T), Rod McCafferty (R) and Tony Szolomiak (NL) were the athletes chosen, whilst Brian Roe (Manager), Des Hardstaff (Asst. Manager) and Frank Nott (Coach) accompanied the team.

In all, the Tasmanian team won eleven medals at the Titles, four by the men and seven by the women.

Rod McCafferty took third place in the Junior Javelin throwing 59.80 m whilst Michael Mol recorded a similar performance in the Pole Vault clearing 4.20 m. He also finished 6th in the Junior Long Jump (6.96m).

Graham Tudor fought well to finish fifth in the Junior 400m Hurdles, setting a new Sub-junior Australian record of 54.75. David Preece was by no means disgraced in the Junior 400m in which he finished seventh in 48.87.

SOCIAL COMMITTEE

Once again this year the Social Committee formed from each club assisted with the success of the various occasions when the social side of NAAB activities were enjoyed.

One of the highlights of the year was the evening of 15th November at the ABC Bowls Club, Racecourse Crescent, when North Launceston Club stalwart and top Northern sportsman, Brian Baxter was presented with his TAAA Award of Merit by TAAA President, Mr. Graeme Briggs. Forty people attended, with Mr. Briggs informing them of some interesting information regarding the early preparations for the 1982 Commonwealth Games to be held in Brisbane.

Although the Social activities at NAAB level seemed limited over the past year compared to some in the past, all the clubs seemed to increase their activities in this direction with fund raising evenings etc.

At the NAAB Presentation Evening on Saturday 21st February, the Social Committee with the assistance of the clubs organised the supper arrangements which was appreciated by those present.

RECORDS 1980/81

Possibly because of the greater number of competition days held at York Park, track records outnumbered field events this season; a reverse of last year. Perhaps field athletes were disadvantaged to some extend by the uneven run ups for javelin, jumping for distance and the lack of concrete throwing circles. This is borne out by only one triple jump and no javelin records.

36 individual and 3 relay records were equalled or bettered during 1980-81.

With 10 hurdles records to his credit, Graham Tudor of the Tamar Club heads the list (in addition he bettered the Tasmanian Sub-junior 400 Hurdles record and the time standard set by the Amateur Athletic Union of Australia to claim a similar record - not yet ratified).

Murat Djakic (NL) and Philip Clarker (R) three records each; Ross Brent (R), Tony Donald (NL), Tim Baldwin (NL) each with two records headed the best of other record holders.

GRADING

Once again the NAAB grading system have proved its worth. Last season the standard of performance was excellent and competition was keen in all grades. Each week many athletes attained a standard which was sufficient to have them up-graded.

The season ended with an excellent weekend's competition at the Northern Championships. Some of the performances over this weekend made the season's efforts worthwhile and gave great satisfaction to all those who give their spare time to help foster athletics in the North.

REGISTRATIONS

Registrations this season have remained on a par with 1979-80. A total of 182 registrations were received, of these, 58 or 31.8% were new athletes registering with the Branch for the first time. Riverside had the highest new athlete total - 53.33% of its membership; followed by Tamar 36.66%, North Launceston 31.14% and Newstead 28%.

As with last year, Riverside had the largest increase in membership, 36.36%, Tamar improved by 25%, Newstead by 2.7%, but North Launceston was down 19.74% on its high total of last year.

FINANCE

No special fund raising efforts or functions were conducted by the Branch this season to ease the burden of expenditure. The budget approved, allowed for increase in ground rental and levies as well as an increase in registration fees to the state association. However, it was not expected that the state levy would be three times the budget figure, so it was with some relief that the state waived one third of the levy due to a higher income than was anticipated.

Athletes registration fees to the Branch were increased as was to be expected and this assisted in maintaining a credit balance.

The Branch sincerely thanks the ladies who collected gate and entry fees each week, not forgetting the hard working band of raffle ticket sellers.

Because of a handsome credit balance in a special fund for Mrs. Shirley Brasher, she was again fully covered with her expenses to attend the World Veterans Championships that were held in New Zealand in January this year. There still remains a sizeable balance in this account.

Some equipment was purchased during the season, but expensive pieces such as landing bags have yet to be made, this cannot be done unless some funding arrangement can be made.

FINANCE

This season's budget was, as usual, a break even one and although this was almost the case (an excess of receipts over payments of \$384 in an amount of \$47,000 could be consider break even). The many items were well out. Some occasioned by the fact that council decided to take over the organisation of all intrastate, interstate and international meetings others by the formation of the new Association, and various other reasons. The Intrastate and Interstate meetings netted a profit of \$4,450 a very handsome amount allowing the levies on the branches to be cut by a third, the stock of uniforms to be built up and a levy to be paid to the A.A.A. of Tasmania to enable it to function in the formative months before income starts to be received.

The Handbook showed a loss of \$272 only, due to \$250 sponsorship by the ANZ Bank, but they are so useful that this is not considered to be too costly. A major feature, of course, was the cost of the Pavilion \$28,192, plus \$732 for furniture. This expenditure was covered by Donations from the Southern Branch, transfer from investments and payments from the No.2 Account but some endeavour must be made to recoup a large percentage of this.

The Tasmanian Government again generously made two grants of \$4000. One to offset the cost of hiring the Domain Athletic Centre and the other to assist athletes who competed in the Australian Track and Field Championships this being distributed in proportion to all members of the mens and womens teams.

Overall the year has been quite a good one in which to wind up the Tasmanian Amateur Athletic Association.

APPRECIATION

The Tasmanian Government continued to support amateur athletics in the most practical manner by making two \$4000 grants as detailed above. This generosity is greatly appreciated, as is that of the various companies who have assisted with sponsorship - Coca Cola Bottlers, Adidas, The Shell Company and the ANZ Bank which assisted with the Handbook.

The Branch committees, various sub committees of the Association, the officials of state teams have all contributed by carrying out their respective duties effectively and efficiently.

As always all sections of the media have been most generous in the publicity given to athletics. Unfortunately with the withdrawal of the Mars Sponsorship the media Awards presented last year could not be continued, but hopefully they may be reinstated some time in the future.

To all others who have assisted during the last year and all the other seventy nine of the Tasmanían Amateur Athletic Associations existence sincere and grateful thanks is extended.

Seven events improved, 10 dropped back and one remained the same. The Hammer moved from last to first due to David Huxley breaking the state record. It is pleasing to see the throwing events improving and the field games overall showing an average of 35 points more than last year 825 to 790. Only three track events improved which is most disturbing.

A comparison of the tenth performance is also interesting, the average dropped from 626 to 624 but ten events improved, five were down and one was the same. Best tenth place was the 800 metres 799 points compared to the 1500 metres in 1980 at 810. Poorest was the Hammer both years 257 this and 308 last.

It is interesting to compare the events which have been top and bottom over the past seven seasons and the points scored.
