

ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION OF TASMANIA

Members,

It is with pleasure that your Council presents the Eighth Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for season 1987/88.

The year has most certainly been a very successful one from the competitive point of view, with results especially in Under Age being better than could ever have been anticipated. Off the field developments have not been nearly as spectacular but progress has certainly been maintained.

The undoubted highlight of the season was the selection of ten Tasmanians in the Australian Under 20 Track & Field Team to tour Europe and North America. before competing in the Second World Junior Championships in Sudbury, Canada in July. Eight of the ten, Gabrielle Prenter - Javelin; Susan Andrews - 400 metres; Joanne Campbell-Smith - 3000 metres; Loretta Kiss - High Jump; Todd Apted - High Jump and Decathlon; Troy Bennett - 100, 200 metres; Darren Edmunds - 400 metres; Glen Turnor - 400 metres have qualified for the World Championships whilst the other two, Greg Robertson - 10000 m. Walk and Dean Rose - Steeplechase could be added to the team if they break standards during the tour. When it is realised the only Tasmanian in the 1986 team was Jodi Allen - 400 m. Hurdles who was selected under the same circumstances as Greg and Dean, the tremendous improvement in the ability of the State's up and coming athletes can be appreciated. Even more impressive is the fact that five will still be eligible for selection in two year's time.

This success together with the results in Australian Championships certainly indicate that the work of Bill Larsen as State Development Officer together with that of Graeme Stowards and the Southern Branch's C.I.G. programme has borne fruit and must be further nurtured.

Congratulations must be extended to the "Tassie Ten" and their coaches and best wishes for even further success during the tour.

As well as being selected in the Junior Track & Field Team Dean Rose was a member of the Australian Junior Cross Country for the second year in a row. He competed with distinction in the World Cross Country Championships in Auckland, New Zealand finishing fourth Australian and fortieth plus overall.

Performances by State teams during the season were equally as impressive. In track and field a total of 45 medals were won by Tasmanians and during the winter 3 gold and 2 bronze were obtained. Full details will be given later in this report, in the appropriate section, suffice to say that eight gold, 13 silver and 29 bronze medallions were won during the 1987/88 season by your athletes — something with which all concerned can be very proud. In addition two Australian records were set by Tasmanians. Dean Rose broke the 3000 m. Under 18 in Melbourne on 12th December running 8m. 15.1 secs. whilst Todd Apted in scoring 7123 points in the Under 18 Multiple Events Championship in Launceston on 20th and 21st February 1988 broke the old record by 105 points.

Tasmania organised and conducted the Australian 15 km. Road Run and Road Walking Championships. They were conducted at Richmond on Sunday 19th June 1987 on a cool but pleasant day. A Select Committee chaired by Deputy President Robin Hood was responsible for all arrangements and comments following the races indicated that it had done its job very well.

The relays meeting, the concept of Prof. Terry Dwyer and first held in 1987 was again conducted on 5th January 1988. It built on the success of last year adding women's relays and all in all was an even better meeting. Publicity was extremely good, top class athletes from New South Wales, Victoria and Tasmania competed and the large crowd which attended witnessed a great athletic meeting. The Australian Junior team set an Australian record when it won the 4×100 metres relay giving some indication of the standard on show. New South Wales won both women's relays and the men's 4×400 metres with Tasmanian teams putting up top class performances especially the women's 4×400 m. team which led into the finishing straight.

The new all weather track at Penguin has been laid and equipment purchased so will be ready for use in the coming season. This development together with the completion and official opening of the grandstand/changing/administrative facility at St. Leonards and the repairs to the Domain Athletic Centre means that all areas of Tasmania now have top class facilities. There can be no excuse now for any athlete not being able to achieve optimum performance.

The development of open athletics has continued with amateur and professional controlling bodies co-operating most amicably. There may be a growing tendency for some athletes not to register with a club as they can still get competition in both areas, clubs must work very hard to counter this by providing incentives for them to want to be members.

The Australian Athletic Union, in its wisdom, resolved at its annual meeting last August to reintroduce standards for entry to Australian Track & Field Championships. This decision was made before the open entry had even been tried. It would appear from the experience in Canberra and Perth that there were no great problems with fields being too big. In a couple of cases athletes of inferior ability entered but this did not cause any great difficulty.

Registrations for the year showed a disturbing decline everywhere except officials and coaches, which in itself is quite heartening. The Northern Branch had the largest drop but the other two branches were not that much behind. There was a greater fall in women registered than men - the percentage being 12.7% to 4% on last year's figures.

The older age groups held up well with a pleasing increase in senior women and Under 20 men. The big decline was in the younger women's age groups - from Under 9 up to Under 15. The turnover continues to be very high. The number of new registrations is very pleasing but the retention rate from year to year is very low.

Your Council is very pleased to report that it was able to negotiate an improved sponsorship deal with Coca-Cola Bottlers Tasmania which covered registration numbers and Schoolchildren Championships. With the Tasmania Bank taking over the Track & Field Championships and already sponsoring the Statewide League it is proposed to discuss the possibility of an overall package covering Intra State meetings other than those for schools.

The contract with Bill Larsen as State Development Officer was renewed in September and Graeme Stowards was appointed to act in a similar capacity in the South. It was hoped that sufficient funds could be generated to enable both to continue throughout the year but this was not possible and Graeme ceased to be employed as from the 31st December. There is little doubt that the initiative of your Association and that of the Southern Branch through the C.I.G. sponsored programme has been a resounding success. The task ahead is to develop it even further, especially in the North West.

As always a tribute must be paid to all who have helped during the year. The administrators of the Association, the branches and the clubs and to all on and off ground officials sincere thanks for your support over the past twelve months.

REGISTRATIONS:

As mentioned the decrease of 82 registered athletes is quite disastrous. The decline must be halted and reversed and ti is up to all sections of the sport to ensure that means are found to attract and hold athletes. Clubs must create incentives on and off the field so that youngsters want to become members and enjoy the sport enough to remain in it. The branches and association will need to look closely at the type of competition provided.

To be able to record an increase of 42 officials and 2 coaches is very pleasing. Hopefully the willingness of parents and friends to help in this regard will continue, easing the strain of the faithful few who are always present.

COCA COLA TASMANIAN ALLSCHOOLS CHAMPIONSHIPS

ST. LEONARDS - 15th November 1987

Entry forms were distributed, as usual, through the Education Department to all secondary schools in Tasmania, as well as through branches and clubs. The conduct was in the hands of the Northern Branch with Simon Phillips being Meeting Organiser and is to be congratulated on his efforts.

The number of entries received was well up to average and an excellent meeting resulted.

Athletes of the meeting were Albert Juhasz - Scotch Oakburn and Terri-Ann Philpott - Brooks High School. Albert won five Under 19 events - 100 metres in 10.9 secs., 200 metres - 22.0 secs., 400 metres - 50.8 secs., Triple Jump - 13.06 m. and Long Jump - 6.98 m. all top standard performances. Terri-Ann also won five events - one Under 19 - Shot Put in a record 12.59 m. throw and four Under 17 - Shot Put - 12.23m. also a record, Javelin - 36.64 m., Discus - 34.82 m. and Long Jump - 5.12 m.

Far fewer records were broken than in 1986 - there were only three by boys - all from the Best brothers - Lyndon broke the Under 19 Hammer and Rohan set new times for the Under 15 2000 m. Walk and Under 17 3000 m. Walk. Girls set eight records and the total of eleven was well below the 32 set last year which was the average for the past three years. Perhaps the standard of records has become fairly high and are now much harder to break

Following the excellent Tasmanian Championships, a team of 28 boys and 19 girls was selected to compete in Brisbane - this was reduced to 25 boys and 17 girls by withdrawals - pretty well average for this particular team. Performances were again top class although the number of medals won - eleven was seven down on last year. One gold, four silver and six bronze were obtained compared to three, ten and five in 1986. Six Tasmanian best on records were established.

Gabrielle Prenter won the Women's Under 19 Javelin to be the outstanding performer and set U18, U19, U20, Senior records. Joanne Campbell-Smith set new figures for 1500 metres and 3000 metres Under 17 - Under 20; Susan Andrews - 400 metres Under 17, Kylie Risk - 1500 m. U15, U16 and Brendon Hanigan - 800 metres Under 15.

The organising committee under the chairmanship of Prof. Terry Dwyer, was able to improve on the original meeting held last year. It provided prize money for the two women's relays and attracted teams from Victoria and New South Wales. In addition many more entries were received for all events so that heats were required for the two gifts and the men's 4×100 metres relay. Increased sponsorship was obtained, basically as a result of the success of the first meeting but it is felt that **value** was received by the sponsors

The performances of top class athletes both local and from interstate provided the large crowd which attended with great entertainment. Right from the start the programme produced plenty of action and great efforts from all competitors. Five state records were set by Greg Robertson – 1500 m. Walk, Joanne Campbell-Smith – 3000 metres and Joanne Sinclair-Burke – Under 20 Long Jump and the Tasmanian women's 4 x 400 metres relay team and then the Australian Junior team equalled the Australian Under 20 4 x 100 metres relay record when it won that event in $40.1~{\rm sec}$.

New South Wales took out the other three relays but only after a great tussle with Tasmania in the 4 x 400 metres women when the home state led into the straight on the last lap. The men's 120 m. Backmarker's Gift looked to be a certainty for Shane Naylor (Vic) until he suffered a slight pulled hamstring about 15 metres from the finish and was just beatin by team mate Tom Sweeney. Launceston girl Joanne Sinclair-Burke provided a surprise by just defeating Diane Brown (Vic) and Jenny Laurendet (N.S.W.) in the women's gift. Another surprise was the great performance of S. Doyle from Queensland who proved far too strong for Dean Giblin and Andrew Lloyd in the Mile Handicap.

The A.B.C. gave great television coverage and announcer Rick Mitchell again, provided an interesting commentary.

Thanks are due to Terry Dwyer and his organising committee as well as sponsors Schweppes, Australian Airlines, Talays, David Goldsmith, Speed for Sale. Also to the Little Athletic clubs for strong support of their events and Adrian Johnston "A.J." who arranged an interesting aerobics display.

It is pleasing to report that the meeting did not quite break even financially but was certainly far better than last year and hopefully 1989 could be bigger and better and even make a profit.

TASMANIA BANK TASMANIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

ST. LEONARDS HOBART 28TH FEBRUARY 1988 5TH, 6TH & 7TH MARCH 1988

Unfortunately due to a change in management policy the Teachers Credit Union did not take up its option to sponsor the championships again. However, with the assistance of its promotion officer, Tony Benneworth, Deputy President Robin Hood was able to successfully negotiate with the Tasmania Bank to take over the sponsorship.

The A.B.C. again telecast a two hour package on Saturday 5th March in Hobart which was replayed at a later date.

The Men's 5000 metres and Women's 3000 metres Senior Championships were held earlier because the Australian Championships were run in Melbourne in early February.

As a result of the closure of the Domain Athletic Centre for repairs which extended for a much longer period than had been indicated at first the Multiple Events had to be transferred to Launceston. Sincere appreciation must be extended to the Northern Branch for incorporating these events into its Northern Championships programme at such short notice.

Entries were extremely good - a tot 1 of 379 - 232 men up 11 cm 1987, and 147 women down 10 for an overall gain of 1 athlete. Total entries were up considerably - by 184 to 1534. However the number of relay teams was quite disappointing only 89 entered compared with 102 in 1987 and scratchings in this area was quite high.

The first day was again held in Launceston at St. Leonards and was an excellent day's athletics catering for the Under 13 to Under 16 age groups.

The three days in Hobart were conducted in conditions which were the best experienced since the track has been on the Domain and as a result performances were of a very high standard.

The Men broke one Australian Under 18 record and seven Tasmanian - 5 Allcomers and 2 Residential - whilst four Women set eight records, two covering three age groups.

The standard of senior athletes both male and female is not strong but under age competitors are making up for this. Of 20 senior events 9 were won by athletes 19 years old or younger. It was almost the same with the women in that 7 out of 18 were won by under age competitors.

Entries in the Men Under 20 continued to improve but although the fields for the same age groups in the Women's events were better than usual many of the competitors were Under 18.

Many athletes produced great performances with some quite exceptional in the younger ages. For instance Stuart Maxwell (Altius) won every field game Under 14 as well as the 90 m. Hurdles and placed in the two sprints. Similarly Andrea Hughes (E.S.) won five Under 16 and four Under 15 events plus two other placings - in fact the three Hughes sisters won a total of 13 titles - a great family effort.

The Hobart Harrier Cup was clearly won by Northern Suburbs after having shared it in the previous two years with Newstead Harriers forcing Sandy Bay back to third Riverside retained the women's senior title which it has held for the past $\rm six$ years but only by the barest margin from Newstead Harriers with Newstead Central third. The Northern clubs certainly dominate scoring 87 points to 16 by South and 8 by North West.

Overall Sandy Bay retained first place for men with Northern Suburbs again second but O.V.A jumped from 7th to 3rd replacing North Launceston. Eastern Suburbs also kepts its women's title again from Sandy Bay whilst Newstead Central changed places with Newstead Harriers moving from fourth to third.

Comparing senior winning performances using the only means available — the old decathlon and heptathlon scoring tables proves quite interesting. In the men Craig Watson's Hammer Throw of 66.16 m. would have scored 1013 points with Glen Turnor's 400 metres 47.8 second on 908 points and Jim Thomson third for his 10.6 — 100 metres 905 points. The average jumped again from 832 to 860. Twelve events improved seven of which were field games.

Loretta Kiss was again the best woman performer. Her High Jump of 1.81 m. would have scored 1040 points. Second was Jocelyn Millar-Cubit's Long Jump of 6.18 m. for 945 with Sandra Speers-Skeggs 400 m. of 55.1 scoring 942 points. The same three events filled the placings last year. The average improved from 856 to 866 with only six events improving.

The Australian Sugar Industry Board had agreed to continue its sponsorship for another two years.

It was reported that the matter of women's triple jump, pole vault, hammer throw and steeplechase had been referred by the I.A.A.F. to its Scientific & Medical Commission It was hoped that its report could be expedited as Australia already had two as Championship events. The Board was authorised to negotiate with the A.C.T.A.A.A. and N.S.W.A.A.A. in order that A.C.T. become a region by 1st April 1989 or earlier if possible.

Most other committees were reappointed.

MERIT AWARD Mrs. J. Petfield (Q) and H. Schubert (Vic)

The Board was asked to discuss with the Track and Field Coaches Assn. the viability of the Under 20 age group and to devise ways of retaining and encouraging athletes into this age group. The Board was requested to institute an urgent review of the decline in registrations over the past 10 years with a view to arresting it.

The Northern Territory A.A. was granted one vote at the Union's general meeting.

AUSTRALIAN ATHLETIC UNION (CONT.)

It was moved and carried that entry standards be re-introduced for Australian Track & Field Championships as from 1st April 1988. Concern was expressed at the problems caused by the present method of entering for Australian Championships and the Board was asked to discuss method of overcoming the time difficulty.

Australian Championship dates and venues were updated and the Board was asked to consider a common entry fee for all championships and also the uniform to be used by athletes not registered with an affiliated club.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS" MEETING:

This meeting was held in Melbourne on 14th August 1987 prior to the A.A.U. Annual General Meeting and the following were main items of interest discussed.

RANKINGS: It was hoped that Paul Jones would be able to issue monthly ranking lists.

MARS AWARDS: Some concern was expressed at the delay in forwarding stationery.

<u>COMPUTERS</u>: There were some problems with programming but it was hoped South Australia and Western Australia would have equipment this year.

NATIONAL ATHLETIC STADIUM:

Facilities had been handed over to the Institute of Sport which determined use. There was still the possibility of the track being taken over by Rugby.

CALENDAR: Dates for 1988 and 1989 track season were agreed to. (This didnot stop Victoria unilaterally changing the dates of its T. & F. Championships to clash with Tasmania).

CHAMPIONSHIP COMPETITION MANUAL:

A pro forma was to be available and certainly would be a great advantage when organising and conducting championships on the irregular basis that occurs now.

BI-CENTENNIAL RELAY:

Jane Allen gave an update on the organisation. (The Relay has been cancelled due to lack of funds).

JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME:

The Sugar Industry had agreed to sponsor for another two years so coaching clinics would continue. There would be coaching camps at the A.I.S. to help prepare the team for the World Junior Championships.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS' MEETING (CONT.)

ENTRY BOOKLET: The suggestion was made that an entry booklet should be produced similar to that of the professionals.

WOMEN'S POLE VAULT:

It was felt that this should be introduced as an invitation event.

AUSTRALIAN TRACK & FIELD COACHES ASSOCIATION:

The Tasmanian Government through the Department of Sport and Recreation gave financial assistance during the year for Coaching Development. This support greatly assisted the Branch in its work and with its plans for the coming year.

Financial assistance was also received from the Rothmans Foundation Sports Division to assist with coaches who attended the A.T. & F.C.A. Victorian Branch Bridging Course. The coaches who attended (Sally-Ann Newlands, Peter Lawson and Helen Boon) found the course of benefit and recommended other Level 1 coaches to take the opportunity to attend a similar course when given the chance.

Courses held in Tasmania this year covered both Preliminary and Level 1 standard in Hobart and Preliminary at Scottsdale. The northern course was held in conjunction with the North East Little Athletics Centre and had coaches in attendance from Launceston, George Town and the Scottsdale area. The southern course, also had a high proportion of Little Athletics coaches from Hobart and the Huon area. Thanks are extended to all coaches who readily made themselves available to lecture and to Helen Boon who co-ordinated courses this year. With the new syllabus for Level 1 and Level 0 (previously Preliminary) much work will need to be done to make this work in Tasmania with its scattered population.

Because of the changed format for the Summer School in Canberra, Tasmania was not represented. However Lynn Larsen and Daphne Holland were in Canberra at that time for the final segment of their Level III. Lynn has since received notification of her accreditation and has become the most recent Level III in Tasmania following her husband Bill who received his accreditation late 1987.

The executive were pleased to welcome John Boas to the state to co-ordinate a Horizontal Jumps Clinic. Athletes from the north of the state availed themselves of the chance to work with him.

Members of the coaches association were once more involved in the Sugar Industry Clinics co-ordinated by Bill Larsen and welcomed this chance to work with the younger athletes.

Flinders Island was again on the schedule of clinics with Daphne Holland and Les Nankervis visiting during the season.

Members have been most impressed with the new Coaches Manual and it is recommended that it be purchased.

AUSTRALIAN TRACK & FIELD COACHES ASSOCIATION (CONT.)

It is pleasing to report an increase in membership and congratulate those long standing members who have been involved as coaches to Tasmanian teams travelling interstate.

STATE DEVELOPMENT OFFICER

As reported previously Bill Larsen was reappointed when his original two year contract ended on 31st August 1987. As the Tasmanian Government's financial contribution had been increased to \$10,000 your Council, which must match the grant \$ for \$, decided to appoint Graeme Stowards also, to act as development officer, based in Hobart. It was hoped that sponsorship could be obtained to enable the appointment to continue all year. This would have provided great benefits, with travel cut considerably and great liaison with schools but unfortunately, no sponsorship was forthcoming, in spite of strenuous efforts.

In November 1987 Bill Larsen attended the Annual Conference of State Directors of Coaching in Melbourne where agreement was reached on a series of a major policy innovations which the National Junior Development Officer Dale Harrobin will recommend to the Union for national implementation. Major, amongst these were (i) changes to the coaching clinics and national camps; (ii) the National coaching accreditation scheme will be reviewed (iii) the national event coaches to be reduced; (iv) Australian Under 23 teams to compete regularly overseas and (v) Schools athletic season to be changed.

There was a disappointing response to the 1987 Sugar Industry Clinics in Launceston and Hobart which will cause changes to be made for the future.

It was found that with the country school clinics there was a tendency for the schools to provide a physical education class rather than allowing access to students with athletic talent and interest.

It is pleasing to report that the coaching development scheme is having results and there are now four accredited Level III coaches in Tasmania plus additional Level II and Level I.

There is continued liaison between the S.D.O. and the Tasmanian Institute of Sport and T.S.I.T. Physical Education program. He also visited the Australian Institute of Sport and discussed changes in A.I.S. policy in regard to the decentralisation of some coaching functions and the future of the Satellite Coaching Scheme.

In February, Channel 6, included five top class athletes together with the S.D.O. in filming for a nationwide children's programme.

ATHLETIC SCHOLARSHIP

In 1987 the number of athletes receiving Tasmanian Institute of Sport Scholarships increased from five to nine.

Joanne Sinclair-Burke, Jocelyn Millar-Cubit, Troy Bennett and Todd Apted had their scholarships renewed. Janne Ware after a year off through injury lost hers, whilst Loretta Kiss, Susan Andrews, Sandra Speers-Skeggs, Greg Robertson and Dean Rose were added.

Six Tasmanians were awarded M.L.C. Junior Development Scholarships. They were Loretta Kiss, Janne Ware, Albert Juhasz, Todd Apted, Greg Robertson and Dean Rose.

APPRECIATION

As always your Association is greatly indebted to quite a number of people and businesses without whom it would be impossible to organise and conduct the sport.

Sponsors, these days, are essential. Without financial support from outside there would be no hope of making progress. So to Coca Cola Bottlers (Tasmania). Tasmania Bank, Australian Airlines, Schweppes, Talay's, David Goldsmith, Speed for Sale, 7HT A.N.Z Bank sincere appreciation is expressed.

All sections of the media have continued to be most generous in the publicity given to athletics. It is unwise to, perhaps, single out individuals but John Briggs of the Mercury, Peter Walsh and Neville Oliver of the A.B.C. and Adrian Johnston of 7HT deserve thanks for assistance over and above what could be expected.

Mention must also be made of the work of officials on and off the ground, team managers, sub committees of the Association and the administration of the three branches.

To all others who have assisted in anyway during the past season your Association extends its grateful thanks.

FINANCE

The financial statement shows an excess of payments over receipts of \$2664.20, but this was almost entirely due to the much larger team travel subsidy than anticipated. Although track & field championship entry was open to all athletes, state selectors only included those of sufficient standard in the Tasmanian Team. Even so teams were bigger than expected and the fact that the championships were in Brisbane meant the budget figure was only half of actual.

The change from charging a fixed registration fee to a levy on the branches certainly placed a huge burden on them.

Sponsorship was increased to an overall figure of \$7,200. The support of Coca Cola Bottlers, Tasmania Bank in this regard is greatly appreciated as is the assistance of Australian Airlines with team manager's air fares.

It is pleasing to report the National Relay meeting almost broke even after last year's large loss. The present figure is \$548.40, but some sponsorship money is still to be paid and another account is in dispute.

Apart from the Track & Field Championships which was up on last year income from other meetings was down especially the Statewide League & Triangular.

The increase in the charge for the handbook resulted in only a loss of \$439 compared with over \$2,000 last year.

BRANCH REPORTS:

SOUTH

As usual the Southern Branch can report on a comprehensive record of activities and achievements during the season. Unfortunately the resignation of the Statistician has meant that the Track & Field ranking lists are not available, but on the positive side, the Branch has invested in a computer system, which should be fully operationally by the start of the 1988/89 season. This computer will ease the burden of Recorders and enable the full potential of the new Interclub points system to be realised. The computer will be trialled during the winter with simulated meeting conditions, after a great deal of work by our Finance Director, Graeme Cruise.

1987/88 has been a successful season, although there are a number of problems that had to be endured. The closure of the Domain Athletic Centre for a number of weeks in January/February interrupted the programme and training, but neverthe less performance of Southern athletes in the State Championships in March demonstrated how standards are improving across a broad range of events.

Undoubtedly the highlight of the season was the selection of a large number of Southern athletes in the World Junior Team. Congratulations to Troy Bennett, Loretta Kiss, Gabrielle Prenter, Glen Turnor, Susan Andrews, Dean Rose and Greg Robertson. We look forward with interest to their achievements on their tour of Europe, the U.S.A. and Canada. Russell Foley has completed yet another season of hard work and success and his trip to the London Marathon has created widespread interest and support.

Many other athletes have been placed in National events during the season and I believe that this is only the start of a great era. We are deeply appreciative of our major sponsor C.I.G. for the support that it has given to the development of athletics during the past season. C.I.G. have been ably supported by Talays, Schweppes, Australian Airlines, Cadbury's and Connor's whose S.A.B. Athlete of the Year, Loretta Kiss, amply demonstrates the ideals of this Award.

The Schweppes-Talay's Australian Relays Meet was bigger and better in 1988 and is now recognised by many as the most exciting athletics meeting on the Australian calendar. Organiser, Professor Terry Dwyer expects greater improvement in 1989.

Once again our Development Programme has been taken to the schools and has encouraged a number of young new athletes to our ranks. We need more in 1988/89 and we appeal to the Clubs to make every endeavour to build their numbers for the coming season.

Unfortunately the Southern Branch Registration Fees have increased significantly but this was necessary to meet levy obligations to the A.A.T. We can only hope that the A.A.T. will continue to put this substantial amount of money to good use in the development and support of athletes throughout Tasmania.

We are still able to maintain Registration Fees at a relatively low level compared to most sports because of the committed and honorary participation of our Officials. It is clear from the Relays Meeting and our State Championships that our Meetings are still the best run in Australia and this was reinforced this year with the staging of the 15 km. Road Race and short distance Road Walk Australian Championships.

The Board of Management has worked hard at continuing the development of the Branch. It is not always easy for Clubs and members to appreciate how much work is required but, with the anticipated departure of several of our extremely valuable Board of Management members at the end of this season we will have to find successors from Club ranks.

Special mention must be made of the exceptional work carried on by our President, Ken McNamara, who has provided an impetus to the achievements of the past 3 years.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

The 1987/88 season belongs to the athletes, their performances throughout the year whether it be Track & Field, Cross Country or Walking have enabled most athletes to achieve P.B.'s and on many occasions make the finals and even win medals at National Level.

The present high standard of athletes can be attributed to a number of factors, the S.A.B./C.I.G. Development Programme in its second full year, a small group of hard working coaches who are supporting their athletes and have set them certain goals and standards, realising if they want to reach the top in their chosen event that success comes only from hard work, dedication to training and striving to perform at one's best.

The main highlight of the season has been the selection of 10 young Tasmanian athletes in the Australian Junior Team to tour Europe and compete in Sudbury, Canada at the World Junior Track & Field Championships. Congratulations go out to all Ten Athletes and we look forward with anticipation of them performing at their best against the world's top junior athletes.

The season has given many other highlights such as: Talay's-Schweppes National Relay Meeting, Tasmanian Track & Field Championship, Australian 15 km. Road Championship, Cadbury Glass & Half Marathon, S.A.B./C.I.G. Interclub Competition, the good response to Cross Country and the Puma Fun Runs.

PEGISTRATIONS: I fully support our Registrar and his comments on this issue.

<u>INTERCLUB POINTS</u>: There was a change in the system this year. Discussions and talks were carried out prior to the start of the season and I believe the new system will be very much better this coming year, as we go on line with the computer recently purchased by the Branch.

OFFICIALS: The lack of regular officials, placed a heavy load on a small number of dedicated and loyal people who are the back bone of the Branch's officials.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT (CONT.)

<u>REPAIRS TO D.A.C. TRACK</u>: This did cause a number of problems for most people, in that we were without the use of the Centre, for some four weeks, and it proved to be a great problem to Coaches, Athletes and the Branch.

However the performances at the Tasmanian Championships, which were conducted in ideal conditions were of the highest standard and all competitors are to be congratulated.

Whilst the Board of Management have worked hard and long throughout the year, there is still room for improvement, the attendance at meetings was well below what is expected, and will need to improve if we are to properly manage the sport in a business like manner.

Two senior member of the Board, Graeme Cruise, Financial Director and Gaven Wood Track & Field Director, will not be seeking re-election, their Management and Organisational Skills will be sadly missed. I thank them both for their commitment to athletes over many years.

I personally want to thank all those people who have contributed in any way to the running of the Branch and the betterment of the sport, be it Track & Field, Cross Country or Walking.

To our sponsors, we thank each of them, for without their much needed financial and material support the sport could not survive.

By the performances of our athletes we are receiving a much bigger media coverage, be it, newspaper, radio or T.V., however we need to do more ourselves.

Finally I list a number of areas we all need to seriously discuss and endeavour to overcome.

- 1. Lack of Administrators at all levels.
- 2. Lack of new officials.
- 3. Lack of Coaches at all levels.
- 4. Retention & Recruitment of Athletes.
- 5. Development of Domain Centre as a Training & Competition Complex.

As a first step to help overcome some of the areas listed above, I will be requesting each Director of the Board of Management, to set up a small sub-committee, so a much wider imput and comment, will enable us to plan and implement changes which will assist our sport.

TRACK & FIELD REPORT FOR 1987/88

Thirteen rounds of the Southern Athletic Branch Inc. interclub premiership were scheduled for the 1987/88 season. Unfortunately only ten were conducted due to the track repairs carried out at the Domain towards the end of the season. This was most unfortunate as the premiership had reached a stage where the remaining rounds would have been very competitive and exciting. The assistance and ∞ -operation given by the Clarence Little Athletic Centre at this time in providing equipment and facilities was appreciated.

The programmes used during the season contained a wide range of events. However, there were occasions, when due to the number of athletes competing, there was considerable strain placed on our hard working officials to keep within the time frame. Further consideration should be given to this time factor and the events involved for next season. On behalf of all involved I would like to express the utmost appreciation to all those hard working officials for their dedication throughout the season. Without these people volunteering their services each weekerd we would never be able to provide an athletic carmival.

The Branch must consider the ways and means of addressing the recurring problem of obtaining access to more officials. When one looks at the current batch of Branch officials you will find that a large majority of them have no immediate involvement with current athletes. Their children are no longer competing yet they have retained their interest in our sport. Notwithstanding the obligation the Branch places on the individual clubs to provide sufficient officials to run the programmes, every endeavour must be made to recruit new officials from the parents of the new and current athletes. Similarly, athletes who have retired must consider offering their services on a regular basis each Saturday. No event should commence until sufficient officials are present to conduct the event in question successfully, without placing undue burden on those officials that are present.

Before the commencement of the 1987/88 Track & Field season I asked all clubs to make suggestions on behalf of their athletes to improve the competition in general. In most instances these suggestions and ideas were adopted and implemented where possible. A similar request should be made to clubs for further suggestions for the next season. The administration of this sport is dependent upon the goals and aspiration of the participants involved. Administrators cannot provide the required vehicle to achieve these goals if they do not know what the athletes require.

The new point scoring system for the interclub premiership was implemented after all clubs had examined the principles involved and had made various suggestions. A number of options were examined before a final decision was made. The consensus of the clubs, that a result could be obtained on the day of competition outweighed all the disadvantages highlighted. It was realised that there would be a huge call on human resources, particularly in the recording area and the method of accumulating the points scored under the system.

I would like to express appreciation for the tremendous effort Mesdames Pat Hood and Margaret Fox put into the recording area throughout the season. On all occasions these ladies carried out the recording functions under extreme pressure, endeavouring to provide a result, or at least an indication of a result during competition.

TRACK & FIELD REPORT FOR 1987/88 (CONT.)

This new point scoring system, in principle, was successful. Yet it came under question as to its accuracy on a number of occasions. Similarly, the question of non-registered athletes not scoring points also highlighted the point of when an athlete is actually registered for the purposes of the interclub competition. Is it when the athlete signs the registration form and pays the required subscription to the Club concerned? Or is it when the Branch Registrar accepts and processes the registration? Part of this process would naturally be the notation of the athletes registration (age and registration number) by the recorders in their registers. As previously indicated all clubs agreed in principle to the new point scoring system, whereby points were allocated during competition. The non-registered athlete competing for the first time scored points but thereafter points were only scored after the recorders had confirmation of the registrations.

PUBLIC RELATION'S REPORT:

Throughout the season, both winter and summer, articles have appeared in the Mercury newspaper, television and radio but only on isolated occasions have these articles been produced through the public relation's office. To me it became extremely frustrating when on a Saturday evening I phoned the cross country results through to the A.B.C. to be told that the results had already been recorded by some other well meaning person, this happened on more than one occasion.

Public relations should be one of the most important positions on the S.A.B. Board of Management. The media must be used to promote athletics to the fullest. At present athletics is a minor sport in comparison to the "Big" sports such as basketball, football and cricket. The sport can not expect to grow when there is no co-ordination between people who produce articles for the media. The only result is a fiasco, with the situation of small articles being printed on different pages of the Mercury when if all articles were consolidated the end result would be one comprehensive article with plenty of depth and interest. This contributed to my confusion and disillusionment in the Public Relation's position.

On occasions through the year I approached businesses throughout the city regarding sponsorship. The major raffle unfortunately did not sell. This was a major blow to the S.A.B. as it was to be our major fund raising venture for the year.

Approaches were also made to V.F.L. Insurance re public liability and personal accident insurance. A great deal of time was put into this, however at this stage nothing has materialised.

SPONSORSHIP REPORT:

This year, as in previous years, the S.A.B. was on the look out for additional sponsors, however, as mentioned in the Public Relation's Report, the sponsorship dollar is much sought after by more and more sporting organisations.

On the 29th of August 1987 at Bundoora Park the Australian Cross Country titles were held in mild warm weather.

Our team was suffering from the flu and many performances were below par.

In the Under 18 women's 4 k. Katrina Gleeson of Northern Suburbs tried hard but was totally outclassed if she had felt better the result would have been totally different.

In the Under 20 Men's event, saw Paul Garrott run as if he was a sprinter. He was up with the leaders for the first 3 k. but then the pressure told and was unable to climb the hill the second time. Tim Price of O.V.A. found the going tough but was able to finish 21st out of 50, in a time of 26 min. 9 seconds. The best performer was Matthew Lennon of Eastern Suburbs who ran a controlled race to finish 12th only 62 seconds behind the winner. (Matthew needed this speed to catch the plane home, arriving at the airport 5 minutes after the scheduled take off time).

In the Open Women's Event Sue Baker-Finch still had the flu and suffered finishing in 30th position.

In the Open Men's Event the story was much the same. Our best was Russell Foley in 26th place a mere 90 seconds behind the winner. Michael Dalton in 54th and Dean Giblin in 70th.

In the Under 18 Men's 6 k, event it was Dean Rose all the way. After a bad start Dean was able to get in behind the Victorian up the hill the first time. He sat on their shoulders till the 2 k. then went to the lead. At the half way mark he led by a mere 5 metres. After rounding the bend he sprinted up the hill to draw away from the Victorians a position he maintained to the end. The M.C. on the day said here comes a Victorian but I soon changed his mind. Dean was glorious in winning.

1987-1988 RACE WALKING:

This is the year that Tasmanian walking took that <u>GREAT STEP</u> forward. With Greg Robertson winning two Australian Titles within a fortnight during the winter followed up by excellent 10 k. performances, earning him a place in the Australian Junior Touring team.

Locally the big improver over the winter was Rohan Best who has moved from a youngster trying hard, to a promising Australian Walker. His fourth place at the Australian All Schools Championships showed this. His time equalled that of third place and was only 2 seconds behind 2nd.

Early in the season the long distance Tasmanian Titles were held. In the U20, 20 k. Ricky Cooke of N.S. blitzed the field. At the 10 k. mark he was 6 minutes in front of Best and 3 in front of Greg Robertson who later retired. Cooke went on to win in a best on record performance by a Tasmanian in 1 hr. 43 min. 39 secs.

Late in the season the 20 k. men and under age short distance titles were held in 35 degree heat, yet a group of walkers took to the road. R. Cooke, Wayne Fletcher, Michael Maddock all of N.S. started in the 20 k. with Maddock winning in just over 2 hours.

Rohan Best won the Under 20 event.

During the track season it was a procession of records, too many to list. The high-light being the 10 k. events. The introduction of these events helped Greg Robertson and his 45 min. 31 sec. was excellent. He walked the second 5 k. over a minute faster than the 1st. Ricky Cooke's second place in 47+ minutes was a creditable performance

Rohan Best continued improving as did Mathew Robertson.

Not to be outdone the Tasmanian 3 k. record holder from 1971 to November 1987, came out of retirement and showed that he had not lost his old form. Starting in D grade Ron Foster was soon back in A.

Kylie Hughes started the season slowly but improved to take out the senior women's track title.

<u>FINANCE</u>

A major change has occurred in the method by which the Athletic Association of Tasmania obtains funds from the Branches. Instead of levying the Branch by an amount per registered athlete, a flat rate is now levied. The amount for 1987/88 paybale by the S.A.B. was \$10,500.00. This was a substanial increase when compared to the amount of \$4,588.00 paid to the A.A.T. in 1986/87 for registrations (\$2,775.00) and levies (\$1,813.00).

Although S.A.B. registration fees were increased for the year, there was still a major funding shortfall in that only \$6,873.00 was collected from registrations compared to the \$10,500.00 by the A.A.T.

The nett result has been that the Branch has had no option but to make a substantial increase in the registration fees for the new season.

Income was also effected by the closure of the Domain Athletic Centre during January and February. Both gate takings and kiosk sales were effected.

Another disappointing aspect was the inability to raise funds through a major raffle. The Board of Management had planned to conduct up to three such raffles during the season and raise approximately \$15,000.00 but these plans had to be abandoned because of the failure to sell sufficient tickets in the first venture.

Further financial problems were encountered when our major sponsor for the development programme substantially cut back on the sponsorship previously promised. As a result it was necessary to tighten the guidelines for funding assistance under the programme.

During the year the Branch invested in new facilities and equipment including: \$1,773.00 for a new jump pit at the Athletic Centre; \$595 for a wind sock at the Athletic Centre; \$4,868.00 for computer equipment and \$1,973.00 for athletic equipment.
