PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 1988/89 season has been one of significant achievement and progress. The major factors, not necessarily in order of importance were:

- * the opening of the splendid new facility at Penguin, giving a boost to the sport in the North-West and a new dimension to the Statewide competition;
- * the selection of ten Tasmanians in the Australian junior squad of 65 for a world-wide tour culminating in the world junior championships in Sudbury, Canada;
- * the selection of Dean Rose in the Australian team for the World Junior Cross-Country Championship for the third year in succession;
- * the record medal tally in the Australian Track and Field Championships;
- * the success of Susan Andrews in the Oceania team for the World Cup in Barcelona in September 1989;
- * the success of the National Relays Meet in January, despite inclement weather and the establishment of that Meet as an important fixture not only locally but interstate;

and

* the competitive excellence of the Tasmanian Track and Field Championships, despite the malignment of a sporting commentator.

The successes of the athletes - and their coaches who now realise what is required to compete at the top level - pose a big challenge to the administrators. To this end, it is pleasing to report that Council appointed a Working Party with Mr K McNamara as Chairman to prepare recommendations for the restructuring of the administrative structure of the Association and its Branches. That Working Party has held three forums in the respective areas, its report will be available shortly and that report will be given the widest possible circulation and consideration. The conclusions of those discussions and the implementation of the consequent recommendations, together with the appointment of the three Development Officers, in conjunction with the Department of Sport and Recreation, can only be for the benefit of the sport and the further enhancement of the progress which has been most evident in the past year. Details of the achievements follow in this comprehensive report.

REGISTRATIONS

Last year's decrease of 82 registered athletes was made up in this season but unfortunately it was not wide spread. It was all through men in the North West Branch. This in itself was most gratifying with all age groups increasing but especially as the greater proportion were seniors. However the decline in the South continued and a total of 13 men and 33 women in 2 years is worrying. North showed an improvement but not sufficient to make up for last year's losses. Apart from North West men there were no increases in senior numbers either men or women.

COCA COLA TASMANIAN ALL SCHOOLS CHAMPIONSHIPS

HOBART - 13 NOVEMBER 1988

Entry forms as usual were distributed through the Education Department to all secondary schools in Tasmania as well as through clubs and branches. Entries were very good 220 boys and 100 girls totally 646 event entries. An excellent meeting resulted.

The standard of this meeting is very high and it is becoming much more difficult to break records - only top class athletes do so now. There were a total of nine set, four by girls and five by boys and three were on the track, four were throws and two were jumps. Lyndon Best (Friends) was the only athlete to set two records - the Under 19 Hammer and Discus.

The number entering the Under 13 and Under 19 divisions continues to disappoint. It is understandable that matriculation students are reluctant to take part in an athletic meeting in November but there is no apparent reason for only 11 boys to take part in Under 13.

Athletes of the Meeting were Kylie Risk (Rokeby) and Mark Jarman (Hobart). Kylie set a new time for the 3000 metres Under 17 - 10 min 18.8 secs and Mark threw the Under 17 Discus 45.44 metres for a new record.

AUSTRALIAN ALL SCHOOLS CHAMPIONSHIPS

CANBERRA 10-12 DECEMBER 1988

A team of 48 was selected to represent the State following excellent Tasmanian Championships. This was reduced to 45 made up of 27 boys and 18 girls through injuries. Of this number 24 travelled to Sydney for the Pacific School Games and they travelled to Canberra by bus to meet up with the rest of the team.

The performance of the team was particularly meritorious winning 5 gold, 1 silver and 2 bronze medals. The outstanding athletes were:

Andrea Hughes, who won gold medals in three events - the Ul5 & Ul7 High Jumps and the Ul5 Javelin. Both Ul5 events were on the same day. In the Ul7 event she jumped 1.79 m, which bettered the previous best in the Ul6 and Ul7 age groups, and in the Ul5 event she jumped 1.76 m which equalled the best by a Tasmanian in the Ul5 age group.

Susan Andrews, who won a gold medal in the U19 200 m and a bronze in the U19 400 m. The performance in the 200 m was all the meritorious because to do it she had to beat the two girls who had beaten her the previous day in the 400 m event.

Simon Hollingsworth, who though only 16, won the U19 400 m Hurdles in 52.39 sec. This was a new Australian All Schools record by about 1 second, was 0.75 sec inside qualifying standard for the World Junior Championships, bettered David Lean's 34 year old Tasmanian Senior, U20 and U19 records, and was only 0.39 sec outside the Australian U18 record.

Kealin Hanigan, who was second in the Ul9 800 m in a time of 1.52.65.

Simon and Tim Hollingsworth, Jason Lansdell and Kealin Hanigan, who were third in the Ul9 4x400 m Relay in a time of 3.17.02, which bettered the previous best by a Tasmanian team in U20 and Ul9 age groups and was better than the Tasmanian U20 and Ul9 records held by Victoria.

Tim Hollingsworth's fourth was only 0.02 seconds behind third place.

Of the 28 athletes who competed in the Pacific School Games before Canberra only four produced their best most of the others were well below whilst more than half these travelling straight from Tasmania were right up to their form. It is obvious young inexperienced athletes find difficulty in coping with intense competition over a length period.

TASMANIA BANK STATEWIDE LEAGUE

Only two rounds were programmed - the first in Launceston on 27 November and the second at Penguin on 22 January. Once again club support varied and rather naturally where clubs had to travel numbers were less than those who were at home. Even so, with calls for more elite and variety of competition it is disappointing when it is provided that more effort is not made to take advantage of it.

Both days provided top class athletics with Eastern Suburbs just defeating Newstead Central and Northern Suburbs in the first. The second proved quite a surprise in that the North West clubs at home, on a magnificent day, not only provided quantity but also quality to score a great win, its first in this competition, relegating Eastern Suburbs and Northern Suburbs to second and third again. This was sufficient for Eastern Suburbs to win the Tasmania Bank Trophy for the first time.

Special mention must be made of the effort of the North West administration and officials who organised and conducted an excellent meeting at the new Penguin track. It really was a great day.

Unfortunately the programmed date clashed with the big Drug Offensive Meet in Canberra to which over 20 Tasmanians were invited to compete and naturally selected as it really was elite competition so the Hobart meeting did not eventuate. Perhaps in 1990.

MULTIPLE EVENTS

PENGUIN

18-19 FEBRUARY 1989

This championship was allocated to the North West Branch and considering it was the first ever to be conducted by it, everything ran very smoothly. The assistance of visiting coaches and officials helped to smooth out any uncertainties in procedure.

Entries from men were surprisingly good totally 16 an increase of 13 on last year. However only five women competed the same as in 1988. The spread over the four men's age groups was very good with only the Under 20 lacking competition.

Todd Apted (NHC) although eligible for Under 20 opted to compete in the Open Division and recorded an outstanding score of 7139 points 61 short of the Commonwealth Games standard, easily setting a new record which will also be an Under 20 record.

NATIONAL RELAY MEET

HOBART 4 JANUARY 1989

In spite of the poor weather conditions, which certainly effected the attendance but not performances this meeting was a great success. Although an overall sponsor could not be attracted Savings & Loans Credit Union replaced Schweppes as sponsor of both mens relays.

Once again New South Wales, Victoria and the Australian Juniors supported the meeting with a Western Australian men's term a welcome addition to the short relay. An innovation was a schoolboys 4x100 m which attracted five entries, one from Killarney Heights School, New South Wales. January is not an ideal time for schools but an event for athletes still at school has potential.

The short programme was full of action and produced seven Tasmanian records including one Australian Under 20 - in the 1500 m Walk - although as this was a handicap event there is doubt as to whether it will be approved. Even so it was a great performance by Greg Robertson. Weiner Reiterer (Vic) set an Allcomers record in the Shot, Joanne Campbell-Smith's (NHC) 5000 metres time of 16 m 46.5 was a Tasmanian U20 and U18 record and the three placegetters in the Women's 4x400 m relay set Allcomers, Residential and Under 20 residential records respectively.

The 120 m gifts provided great running with NSW Craig Stephenson beating Shane Naylor (Vic) in the men's event. Melissa Moore (NSW), Jan Meres (Vic) and Kathy Sambell all were timed at 13.7 sec in the final of the women's 120 yards handicap but were placed in that order. New South Wales won all four relays but received stiff opposition all the way especially the women's 4x400 m where Tasmania again showed its strength by finishing a close second.

The Mile Handicap proved fairly easy for Malcolm Norwood from the scratch mark. He took the lead with a lap to go and was never really threatened. The ABC covered the meeting again with highlights being replayed later the same night. Rick Mitchell's commentary and Alan Rider's "on ground" interviews helped to entertain the large crowd.

Unfortunately on the financial side the meeting still recorded a loss but athletically it is undoubtedly a great success.

Tasmania Bank agreed to continue its sponsorship of the State Championships and although the ABC had agreed to telecast a two hour package on Saturday 4 March it withdrew just a few days before. As it turned out the ABC and Tasmania's TV watchers were the losers as the athletics produced was tremendous. Not only was it so on the Saturday but all through the four days there was great competition.

Entries were an increase on last year -237 men up 5 and 157 women up 10 - a total of 394, up 15. There was a small improvement in the number of relay teams entered -94, 5 more than 1988, even so there doesn't seem any great enthusiasm in some clubs to be represented in as many relays as possible.

As usual the first day was held at St Leonards and the 51 events set the standard for the next weekend. The weather in Hobart was absolutely magnificent and the achletes responded accordingly. The men broke 11 Allcomers, 2 Residential and 1 Club record and equalled 1 Allcomers whilst the women broke 6 Allcomers, 1 Residential and 1 Club record — a total of 23. In winning the Norman Hutton Memorial 400 metres Open in 47.3 Simon Hollingsworth (OVA) set 4 Allcomers and 1 Residential record and ran the second fastest 400 m by an Australian. Jo Cubit's 13.8 sec for 100 metres as well as being a Tasmanian record bettered the Commonwealth Games selection standard.

Once again the younger athletes dominated the Open competition and not because the standard was poor. Of 36 individual events, 22 were won by athletes aged from 16 to 19.

Many athletes produced great performances, far too many to list all but a few. Susan Andrews (ES) completed the Open sprint treble defeating top class athletes in all three and setting an Under 18 Allcomers record with her 400 metres time of 54.1 sec. Joanne Sinclair-Burke (NH) and Terri-Anne Philpott (R) showed their versatility by each winning five events whilst Janne Ware (NH) won four, however Andrea Hughes (ES) overshadowed them by winning 1 Open and 9 Under 16 events - including all field games in that age groups.

Todd Apted (NH) as would be expected of a top class decathlete won 3 Open and 5 Under 20 events whilst Jason Lansdell (SB) completed the Under 18 sprint treble.

Newstead Harriers improved on last year's second placing to win the Hobart Harrier Cup for men's club open competition. Sandy Bay forced the titleholders Northern Suburbs into third place. Newstead Harriers completed the club double by winning the women's open.

Overall Northern Suburbs easily displaced Sandy Bay as the highest points scoring club with Eastern Suburbs third whilst Eastern Suburbs retained the women's title improving by 4 points. Altius surprised somewhat by jumping from fifth to second relegating Sandy Bay to third.

Using the old decathlon and heptathlon tables to compare performances the best men's effort was again Craig Watson's Hammer Throw of 65.48 m worth 964 points. Todd Apted's 2.10 m High Jump was second and Simon Hollingsworth 47.3 sec third. The average remained at 860. The women's High Jump was again the premier performance. Andrea Hughes 1.77 m would have scored 1002, second was Susan Andrews 54.1 sec 400 metres 980 and third Gail Luke's 800 metres of 2 m 7.7 worth 960. The average jumped from 866 to 889 quite significant. In all of 35 open events 22 improved, 12 dropped and 1 was identical.

MERIT AWARD

A great deal of discussion took place in regard to the Treasurer's Report. A revised budget was adopted and as a result of amendments to the Income & Expenditure statement which had showed a deficit of \$80,380 reduced to \$3,380 on a cash basis.

It was agreed to appoint a consultant as soon as possible to assist in raising an amount of \$50,000 net, to balance the 1989 Budget and to fundraise as an ongoing concern.

A motion was passed which stated that as from 1 January 1990 Australian Track & Field Championships Schools excepted, be offered to tender with most expenses to be met by the State Association conducting the Championships. Associations conducting Winter Championships in 1989 would do so at no cost to the AAU.

It was agreed that athletes under 15 years of age would not be eligible for selection in Australian teams.

The Treasurer was asked to investigate a possible rebate of registration fees to States in respect of athletes Under 15 years old. The suggestion was made to encourage the recruitment of younger athletes.

The standards committee were to be asked to review the entry standards for Australian Championships. It was felt that when the standards had been reintroduced they should have been made as lenient as possible to encourage as great a participation as possible whilst returning a reasonable standard.

Capitations were reintroduced and were struck at \$6.50 per athlete for year ended 31 March 1989.

DEVELOPMENT

, ,- -

The State Development Officer, Bill Larsen, did not seek reappointment when his term finished on 31 August 1988. He continued his work during the winter which included Sugar Industry Coaching Clinics at Penguin, St Leonards and Hobart. He had assistance from other local coaches and athletes and the clinics were most successful.

When Bill advised he would not be seeking reappointment, a committee which had been set up to present a three year development plan to the Department Of Sport and Recreation, recommended that there be an appointment from each area - South, North and North West - with the prime aim of increasing participation on athletics.

The Department agreed to finance this concept on a \$ for \$ basis with the Association. Each branch was asked to recommend an appointment in its area. North West was first to move and Malcolm Wells was appointed in February. The Northern and Southern appointments of Belen Boon and Alan Rider commenced one month later.

Their duties have been set out in great detail and they are carrying them out very successfully to date. One greast achievement by Malcolm Wells was organising coaching visits to schools on the West Coast. A great deal of work was necessary to co-ordinate this but the results will undoubtedly be most worthwhile.

Three open forums were organised following the end of the track season co-ordinated by Southern President, Ken McNamara to discuss the development of the sport. Attendances were extremely good - from all areas - athletes, coaches, officials - and the discussion will undoubtedly prove most fruitful in the reorganisation of competition which seems certain to occur in the near future.

ATHLETIC SCHOLARSHIPS

The Tasmanian Institute of Sport under the Chairmanship of Professor Terry Dwyer was again very generous to athletics providing thirteen scholarships. The nine athletes who received assistance in 1987 were again awarded scholarships in September 1988 whilst four of the younger brigade were added. The complete list is: Susan Andrews, Todd Apted, Troy Bennett, Joanna Campbell-Smith, Darren Edmunds, Loretta Kiss, Jocelyn Cubit, Gabrielle Prenter, Greg Robertson, Dean Rose, Joanne Sinclair-Burke, Sandra Speers-Skeggs and Janne Ware. Early in 1989 the performances of Gail Luke, Simon Hollingsworth and Rod McCaffterty saw scholarships awarded to them also.

MLC awarded development scholarships to Todd Apted, Terri-Ann Philpott, Gabrielle Prenter, Greg Robertson, Dean Rose and Janne Ware.

AUSTRALIAN TRACK & FIELD COACHES ASSOCIATION

The Tasmanian Government through the Department of Sport and Recreation again provided financial assistance for Coach Development and Rothmans Foundation also extended support in various areas.

The President, Helen Boon represented Tasmania at the IAAF Oceania Jumps Conference. It proved to be a most worthwhile experience.

Some nineteen athletes and coaches attended a weekend seminar at the Launceston Church Grammar School on Weight Training which was conducted by Peter Naylor, Mike Edwards and Gus Puopolo.

Quite a number of courses were conducted during the year. Three Level O and Level 1 courses were attended by forty six people - from multiple areas - parents of senior and little athletes, senior and junior athletes and also teachers with quite a number being new coaches.

Sports Medicine courses and General Principles Courses were co-ordinated by the Department of Sport and Recreation.

Tasmania did not have any applicants for the Level 2 Course but Kevin Prendergast has been endorsed for the Level 3.

With the assistance of Bill Larsen it is hoped to include the Level 1 course as part of the Physical Edcuation programme at the TSIT.

The following clinics were conducted -

<u>Sugar Industry</u> co-ordinated by Bill Larsen with assistance from Association members. Numbers attending were a big improvement on previous years.

Flinders Island Daphne Holland, Tony 2ito and Les Nankervis spent a very pleasant weekend on the island with a number of very keen athletes.

St Helens Peter MacMichael and several senior athletes spent a weekend in this area with younger athletes and their parents.

Little Athletics Members have assisted with the Little Athletics Regional Clinics and Aussie Sports programmes. Race Walking has been introduced this season.

Women in Sport Lynn Larsen conducted a Hammer and Pole Vault clinic with the assistance of two mainland coaches and senior athletes with immediate results as far as the Hammer was concerned but there appears to be quite a way to go before the Pole Vault will attract many female competitors.

Congratulations are extended to Bill Larsen on being selected as Department of Sport and Recreation Coach of the Year. Albert Johnson was also nominated, so athletics had two of the four contenders.

Although membership is continuing to increase, several Level 2 and 3 coaches have not renewed their membership which is most disappointing. Statistics at the end of the season were:

On behalf of the Records Subcommittee I have much pleasure presenting a report for the athletic season 1988/89.

From 13 November 1988 to 24 April 1989, 84 individual records were claimed, including four inaugural records (pole vult women), plus ten relays, making a total of 94 records. This was an increase of 30 record claims, which reflects great credit on the performances of our athletes, by either establishing a record or to equal it.

Best performances outside the state were 11 individual and two relays, making a total of 143 certificates issues to athletes.

Once again I wish to extend my sincere thanks to Mr Robin Hood, member of the subcommittee, for compiling our Tasmanian records as at 1 February 1989.

In concluding my report may I suggest that team managers who are supplying lists of "Best Performances" outside the state, furnish the following information:

- (a) Name of athlete's club
- (b) Place and date of performance
- (c) Copy of result sheet verifying the performance
- (d) These claims to accompany Manager's report.

Unfortunately some results were not received until April, when the championships were held in December 1983. This delay entails extra work for the subcommittee.

I wish to thank the branches for their cooperation, especially their record committees for forwarding on the records so promptly to me. A special thank you to Robin for his assistance during the year. Congratulations to the athletes who have established these records.

SOUTH

Since the last report the entire athletics community was saddened by the passing of a great stalwart and Branch Finance Director Graeme Cruise. Already the Sandy Bay Club, of which Graeme was a life member, has established the first Cross Country Event of the season as a Memorial to Graeme and in the coming 1989/90 season we will see the new computer based inter-club records and points scoring system established. Graeme spent a great deal of time developing this new system and earlier ones for Fun Runs etc, for the benefit of the Branch.

Perhaps one of the most important highlights of the 1988/89 Season was its resurgence and growing strength of the Clubs. We continue to have concern about the number of athletes participating in this sport but it is clear that the clubs are becoming more evenly matched and this can only provide a long term benefit. Northern Suburbs have broken through to win the Men's Premiership after thirteen straight by Sandy Easter Suburbs Women have similarly broken Sandy Bay's grip on the Premiership. These two clubs have recruited well and invested a great deal of time and interest in the young members and richly deserve their successes. At the same time OVA and Altius are going from strength to strength with Altius producing a very talented group of junior women and OVA fielding arguably the strongest team of middle distance men Tasmania has seen in one Club. Meanwhile Sandy Bay is down a little but certainly "not out" as it continues to provide a very high proportion of State Team members in National Track and Field Competition.

At an individual level the year commenced with great performanced by Russell Foley in the London Marathon and our group of young athletes who represented Australia at the World Junior Games in Canada. At Cross Country and later on the track, Dean Rose produced some fine performances and we were not disappointed by the recent Track & Field season in which our athletes took off and moved the standards another stage forward. Brilliant performances were recorded at a State and National level by Susan Andrews, Keilan Hanigan, Simon Hollingsworth, Greg Robertson, Andrew Hughes and Stuart Miller.

A large group of youngsters attended the Pacific School Games in Sydney and reports suggest that the atmosphere of these "Mini Olympics" will be an inspiration to many of them continuing in the sport of athletics in the years to come. The depth of athletics is improving and this was demonstrated by the standard of middle distance running, sprinting and our relay teams, no better exemplified than by the Under 18 Men's 4 x 400m team at the Brisbane Championships.

The "Tassie 10" are moving towards senior ranks. Following in their footsteps is a sparkling array of younger athletes who are proving at National level that Tasmania has the potential to become, at the very least on a per capita basis, the pre-eminent state in the field of athletics. This pre-eminence will depend not only on the athletes and their coaches but also on the environment that we create for the sport. Tasmania has established a reputation for the best administration of the sport in Australia, but we have depended now for a long time on key administrators who need support and successors as we move towards a new generation. There is some reluctance on the part of parents to participate in club and branch administration and if this reluctance is not set aside then administration, which includes our ability to raise funds to support athletes, to run meetings which attract elite participation and to successfully hold National Cahampionships, will fall away.

During 1988/89 the branch was very pleased with the participation of club supporters in the conducting of SAB meetings. If this trend continues we will not have any worries with our meetings. However, we have had difficulty in getting sufficient support at a branch level. Our President, Ken McNamara has carried an immense load and plans to devolve administrative activities to a series of committees working with individual Board of Management members. It is up to all clubs and individuals to support this move. There has been some comment that all the clubs want is support for elite athletes and a minimum of expenditure on administration. This is, however, a recipe for disaster. If the sport is not properly administered then it will lose credibility. We must have a wider vision and greater ambition. The current review of the structure of athletics in Tasmania gives us this opportunity. involved in the Southern Branch must make the most of it for the future of our sport.

Unfortunately inclement weather robbed us of two interclub rounds early in the season. Luckily one of the rounds foregone was completed prior to the end of the season due to the AAT cancelling one of its statewide competitions.

The planned introduction of our computer system did not eventuate. Southern branch stalwarts Pat Hood, Lyn McNamara, Chris Wilson, Rachel Wilson and Wayne Mason were largely responsible for ensuring that the administrative side of the interclub competition ran efficiently. Clubs and athletes should be extremely grateful to these people as a lot of work is involved, particularly in the grading of athlete and compilation of premiership points.

The programming of our computer system is almost complete and it is anticipted that operational trials will be completed during the off-season. We look forward to the 1939/90 season as one which will see athletes' registrations, event entries and premiership points tallies on computer base. The programs should assist in providing clubs with up to date competition results and premiership points at close of competition each Saturday.

Unfortunately on this occasion I must extend some criticism to the thoughtlessness of some athletes and coaches. Several complaints were received during the season over the use of the Domain Athletic Centre on training nights. It must be understood by all that everybody deserves a fair go. Track athletes in particular must remind themselves that their field event colleagues are entitled to train without interference. When athletes are training in the cage or on the javelin runway, track athletes should warm up or warm down around the outside of the track. apart from the consideration to others the safety factor is paramount.

Complaints about hurdles left in the middle of the track, athletes running in squads of 7-8, or more, using up the majority of the track are just some of the complaints received.

During the off-season, representatives from the clubs, the Special Competitions Director and the Track and Field Director will be meeting to consider the interclub competition and programming for the 1989/90 season. Already several proposals have been made which would see a change to the program format.

The 8th presentation evening was held at Carlyle Hotel on Friday, 21 April. It was pleasing to see all clubs well represented and a pleasant evening was had by all.

The highlight of the evening was the presentation of the Connors/Adidas SAB Athlete of the Year Award, this was won by Greg Robertson of Sandy Bay Harriers Club. The final points in the Award were:

The North West athletes performed excellented and for the first time, won a round of Statewide League. The strength is there but the will must support it.

Day Two was, from the weather point of view, magnificent. Athletically it was a really good meeting. The North West Branch officials were out in force and did a great job.

Eastern Suburbs did enough on the day to finish a well deserved second which ultimately was good enough to win the overall competition for Rounds 1 and 2. Well done Brian Hughes and yur very enthusiastic officials. You were rewarded by the loyalty and talents of your athletes.

REGISTRATIONS

Our branch registered five less athletes this year than in the last season which makes our numbers the lowest since 1982/83. We are fairly evidently, not a growth sport. In other words we are not attracting people to our sport as paticipants in the proportion we would like. Other sports have become popular with young people and we are apparently not attractive enough to compete in the open market.

Track and field is a tough sport. It requires great self discipline, significant effort (and pain), and single-minded commitment to succeed, and it is understandable that athletics is not as easy as sunbathing or socialising or watching TV or 'bombing around' in a car.

In my view it is not so much the attracting of young people to our sport - we do that very well if you look at the under 16 registrations - but the retention of them. This applies particularly to young girls. Look at our female registrations under 16. Perhaps we need to conduct a survey amongst our young female athletes to find out why they are not prepared to stay in the sport.

As your Registrar it is pleasing for me to report the very much improved lodgement of registration cards etc. Club were most cooperative and had them in well on time which made for very much easier processing. I commend those people from each club who assisted me in this way.

FINANCIAL REPORT

1988-89 has been quite successful from a cash-flow viewpoint, but a closer look at the result will indicate that it was achieved at the expense of the long-term development of athletics in Tasmania (this is not a criticism of the Branch executive, but a reflection of the fact that there is a limit to the time that part-time voluntary officials can devote to the sport).

The major items that contributed to income were registrations, sponsorship, investment interest, and entry fees for the track and field season. although income from registrations exceeded AAT levies, this resulted from the decision of the AAT not to appoint at development officer, and the subsequent reduction in the levy imposed on branches.

Investment interest resulted from an accumulation of reserves, associated with high interest rates. While rates remain high, we will continue to derive a considerable proportion of our income from this source, but it must be questioned whether this is an appropriate use of our funds. Although it may seem a significant amount, it must be realised that our fixed term investments would barely cover the salary of a full-time administrator for a year.

Sponsorship continued to be the major source of income. A significant portion of this was for specific events, and was used to ensure that they were run profitably. As regards development, a long term source of sponsorship must be assured, and we cannot realistically expect to guarantee this when none of the branch members is willing to take on the role of public relations and sponsorship.

On the expenditure side, we spent very little on travel grants. This was a result of the late receipt of one of our major sponsorships, and the consequent uncertainty of our ability to fund travel (the funding of our athletes to the World Junior championships is not reflected in these accounts).

In summary, we are in a healthy position financially and have a basis on which to promote athletics.

It is pleasing to see more activity within the Branch Management Committee. It's not enough, but it is improving.

It is very important that we have all sub-committees now, with all the changes coming up and further commitments to the NAC.

Certainly, start at club level from committee up, but as you progress through, groom somebody to fill your spot. It is now impossible for an administrator of the branch to hold more than one position if they are serious.

Finally I must thank a lot of people who have helped and supported me and the branch over the years. I won't mention any names this year apart from our Secretary, Elma Waldren. But thanks to those people, reliable people, who have supported the branch and athletics, whether you were an overworked official at track and field or cross country, an entry steward, a canteen worker, gate-keeper, or whatever, thank you very much.

TRACK AND FIELD REPORT

Schools' Cup

This event gave school-age competitors an experience of athletics over an extended period and the opportunity to compete on the new synthetic track. The aim was to promote interest in athletics, raise the standard of school competition by providing more experience and also recruit new athletes for clubs (successful).

The competition was promoted in the schools and held over four weeks 30/10/88-19/11/88 (school carnival time). Athletes took part in normal interclub events and gained points for each event they competed in. Points were averaged according to the size of schools. Winning schools won a trophy and \$50 athletic equipment.

The event appears to have great potential to widen interest in athletics in the school-age population.

Opening of New Track

The official opening of the Penguin Bicentennial Athletic Centre took place on Monday, 7 November 1988. North-West branch athletes and competitors from Little Athletics and other centres took part in the six hour program. A plaque was unveiled by the Hon Robin Gray, Premier of Tasmania and Senator Ray Devlin.

Press Campaign

Athletics was promoted in the period leading up to the track and field season by a series of articles in "The Advocate". Written by Mrs Jan Radford, they covered different tracka nd field events - their technique and historical background. Leading local performers were features and information was also given about the North West branch program.

Interclub

This competition started on 15/10/88 and concluded on 11/2/89. There were four rounds of programs A, B C and new events were included on a regular basis – steeplechase, 1500m walk, and 4 x 400m relay. Other events were also conducted on a "demonstration" basis – pole vault, hammer and 300/400m hurdles. The new centre also allowed us to run Long and Triple Jump which was impossible the previous season.

There were some initial problems with the new entry procedure but it was eventually refined by Frank Walker and his computer sheets. The local record book was virtually rewritten with many long standing records being broken.

State_League

Round one at St Leonards (27/11/88) was not well supported by NW athletes. It was a busy time of year for many competitors with school exams and school athletic carnivals. the NW branch had also conducted interclub on Saturday and few wanted to travel to Launceston on Sunday.

Round two at Penguin (22/1/89) was very well supported and the North West actually won the competition for the first time. It also gave the NW branch a chance to host a major State event. Many competitors and administrators complimented us on the conduct of the event.

Twilight Meetings

Four were held between November and February. Mild, still conditions prevailed at all meetings making it particularly conducive to good times on the track. Although small numbers took part it was felt to be worthwhile.

Penguin APEX Carnival - Point Score Championship

Twelve women and eighteen men took part in the event conducted in three age groups. Competitors in the 12 to UI5 and 15 and over groups selecting five events from 100, 400, 1500, discus, high jump and shotput. Younger athletes in the 10 to UI2 group had the 800m instead of the 1500m. The competition gives all round athletes the chance to take part in a "multiple events style" format. Points were scored on placings in events.

The Penguin APEX Club provided trophies for winners of individual events, age group champions and overall champion. The competition was close with placings often beig decided on the last event.

The squad was selected from performances at the NW All Schools Championships and the interclub program. Record breakers from the previous season and members of the Pacific Schools team were also included.

Fairbrothers provided T-shirts for squad members and free coaching clinics. There was difficulty this year in obtaining coaches which highlights the need to develop local coaches.

Overall the track and field competition took a huge leap from "picnic races" to "Olympic standard". The new track and the hard work of many people made this possible. The appointment of a Development Officer and a Junior Coaching Development Officer for the coming season ensure further progress.

RECORDS REPORT

As anticipated, athletes produced some outstanding performances at the new athletic complex during the 1988/89 summer program setting 119 records overall; 81 track and 38 field. Some long-standing records dating from 1961 onwards were broken and this indicted the quality of the competition throughout the past season. Inaugural events and records included circular hurdles, steeplechase, hammer throw, pole vault and triple jump, decathlon and heptathlon events.

It would be unfair to "single out" any individual for special recognition so I congratulate all our athletes on their achievements, their dedication and their professional approach towards athletics.

CROSS COUNTRY REPORT

The 1983 season opened at the Spreyton Racecourse with a record attendance of 170 competitors which indicated the growing popularity of "Fun Running".

This set the stage for a highly successful season where the average weekly participation was 124.

1988 also saw the introduction of two new courses one of which, "Fulton Park", appears destined to become one of the best in Tasmania. From the initial scheduling of a normal weekly meeting we also conducted the Eric Goss Memorial Teams Events between North, South and North West, and our own Coastal Championships. The course itself in the picturesque setting along the Forth River amongst the tall timbers and open paddocks received favourable comments not only from our own but also the southern and northern athletes.

In fact, so well was this course accepted that the state body has seen fit to allocate the 1989 Tasmanian All Schools Championships to the venue. With so much of every race able to be seen the viewing audience were treated to some top class performances.

Some amazing improvements - fourteen altogether and only three declined. Russell Foley's 10,000 metres 29 m 35 was the best performance of the year.

The High Jump again was the best performance - Andrea Hughes' 1.77 m but the overall standard was much higher with eight events improving.

The statements show a large decifit of \$4 752 but this is because a State Development Officer was not appointed to replace Bill Larsen and the Branches were not asked for the last one third of their levies totalling \$10 000. Even so there were some unexpected variations from budget.

The receipts from the Track & Field Championships were up \$1 833 on budget due to very good entries, increased entry fees and magnificent weather on all four days. The National Relays meeting however lost approx \$2 000, again because of the weather, parking problems and difficulties in attracting sponsorship. There was also quite a large loss on the production of the Handbook. Sales were well done and also income from advertising.

Unfortunately the Australian Athletic Union updated its registration levies and Tasmania had to pay for two years in one. A large supply of IAAF Handbooks were purchased but in spite of assurances that they were needed only about half were sold. Travel subsidies were underestimated and cost an additional \$1 844. Most other items were reasonably close to budget with the exception of cross country championships where the high cost of hiring the Rokeby Police Academy was not anticipated nor was the expense of conducting the Forums to discuss the future of athletics.

With the selection of ten Tasmanian athletes in the Australian Junior team to tour Europe and compete at the World Junior Track & Field Championships in Sudbury, Canada it was felt that they should receive support from the athletic fraternity. Accordingly a committee of Alan Rider, Neil Sargison, Murray Harper, Wayne Mason, Grant Douglas, Graeme Stowards and Ken McNamara was formed to co ordinate fundraising. Through a lapathon, the business community and the general public an amount of \$14 657 was raised. Each of the eight athletes who eventually toured plus Dean Rose who was selected to compete in the World Junior Cross Country Championships received assistance. After expenses were deducted there is a balance of \$1 402 which will be the basis for ongoing fundraising for future Australian representatives from Tasmania.
